**Our Numbers** 

In December 2023 Loudon Food Pantry gave out enough food to 245 individuals for them to prepare 8,524 meals. Of these people, 111 were age 60 and older (45%), 64 were age 18 or under (26%), and 70 were between those ages (29%). Our meal numbers are lower than in November because Capital Region Food Program provides about 95% of the holiday baskets given out (done with vouchers).

Gift of Lights (NH Motor Speedway)

Thanks to the generosity of the donors and everyone involved we received 2,342.90 pounds of food from the Gift of Lights. This will help those we serve to create over 1,952 meals. Excellent job!

To escape winter, animals such as birds, whales, bats, caribou, elk, and monarch butterflies migrate to warmer climates

There are animals that hibernate during the winter which include bears, snakes, groundhogs, skunks, hedgehogs, bumblebees, woodchucks, bats (the ones that don't choose to migrate), ground squirrels, moths, fat-tailed lemurs, and turtles.

There is a New Zealand insect called the weta that freezes completely solid when the temperatures drop. When the weather starts to warm up again, it thaws and goes back to doing what Weta insects do.

#### **Bacon and Tomato Cups**

8 slices bacon

½ cup mayonnaise
1 tsp. dried basil
1 16 oz. can refrigerated buttermilk biscuit dough (not Grands)

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Lightly grease a mini muffin tin. Cook bacon until crisp, drain. Crumble into a medium bowl; add tomato, onion, cheese, mayonnaise, and basil. Separate biscuits into halves, horizontally, and press each half into prepared muffin tin. Bake for 10 -12 min. or until golden brown. Repeat with remaining biscuits and filling. (If 2 mini muffin pans are available, this last step can be avoided.)

#### **Apple Crumb Muffins**

1 apple, cored 1 (16 oz.) pkg. pound cake mix 1/3 cup old fashioned rolled oats 1⁄4 chopped almonds 6 T. butter, at room temp. 2 eggs 1⁄2 cup milk 1 tsp. ground ginger

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Line muffin cups with liners. Slice half of apple; chop remaining half. In a bowl, mix <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup cake mix, oats, almonds and 3 T. butter. Mix remaining cake mix, eggs, milk, ginger and remaining. Stir in chopped apple. Divide among muffin cups. Top with crumb mixture and apple slices. Bake 20 -25 min.

#### **Easy Burrito Casserole**

- 1 lb. hamburg
  1 small onion
  1 packet taco seasoning
  1 can refried beans
  1 can cream of mushroom soup
  ½ cup sour cream
  1 pack large flour tortillas
  2 1/ cups obradded Mexicon bland shares
- 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups shredded Mexican blend cheese

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Cook beef, drain. Add taco seasoning and refried beans with sour cream. Spread half in bottom of 2 qt. baking dish. Add layer of 3 tortillas cutting or tearing to make them fit. Spread on a layer of hamburg and top with about 1 cup cheese. Repeat all layers and top with remaining cheese, Bake about 20 min. or until cheese is melted.

#### Caramelized Onion 'n Spinach Egg Bake

T. light whipped butter
 cups thinly sliced sweet onions
 tsp. salt
 cups spinach leaves

- 1 tsp. chopped garlic
- 4 wedges Laughing Cow Light Creamy Swiss cheese

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Coat 8" square baking pan with cooking spray. Place butter in large non-stick skillet and bring to medium-

spray. Place butter in large non-stick skillet and bring to mediumhigh heat. Add onions and salt; cook, stirring occasionally until slightly softened – about 5 min. Reduce heat to medium-low; stirring frequently, cook onions until caramelized, 25-30 min. Transfer to a large bowl. Add spinach to pan; cook and stir until just wilted, about 2 min. Transfer to bowl with onions; stir in garlic and cheese wedges, breaking wedges into pieces, stirring until cheese has melted. Cool onion mixture, then add egg substitute. Transfer to baking pan and bake 50 min. or until center is firm. Top with sour cream to serve.

#### Overnight Cheese Casserole

9 slices 2 day old bread salt and pepper to taste
2 ½ T. instant minced onion
1 lb. Cheddar cheese
4 eggs
3 cups milk
1 tsp. dry mustard
2 tsp. Worcester sauce

Cut 3 slices of bread in 3 strips and fit tightly on bottom of ungreased 2 qt. casserole. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and 1/3 on the onion. Grate 1/3 of cheese over this, even it out and press down. Make 2 more layers the same way. Beat eggs slightly and add milk, mustard and Worcester sauce. Pour over bread layers. Let stand for at least 8 hours, preferably overnight, in refrigerator. Remove from frig 2 hrs. ahead of serving time. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 15 min. or until firm in the center. Yields 4-6 servings

#### **Blonde Brownie Pie**

stick butter
 1/2 cup It. brown sugar
 2 large eggs
 1 tsp. vanilla
 1 cup flour
 1/2 tsp. baking powder
 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips
 1 T. unsweetened cocoa powder
 13 fun size Snickers bars plus a few more for garnish, all cut fine

Coat a 9" glass pie pan with nonstick spray. Melt butter and brown sugar in a large sauce pan over medium; heat until mixture starts to bubble. Remove from heat and let cool 10 min. Stir in 1 egg and the vanilla until blended. Then stir in flour and baking powder until smooth. Scrape  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup into prepared pie plate (mound it up). Freeze 10 min. or until firm. Meanwhile, heat oven to 350 degrees and melt  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup chocolate chips as package directs. Stir melted chips, remaining egg and the cocoa powder into remaining batter. Remove pie plate from freezer and press chilled batter evenly over bottom and half way up the sides. Top with Snickers, then chocolate batter. Bake 24 to 27 min. until a wooden pick comes out with a few crumbs attached. Sprinkle remaining  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup chocolate chips in middle ; let stand until soft, the spread to blonde crust in decorative swirls. Top with a small handful of Snickers pieces.







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The Loudon Fire Department responded to 916 calls for emergency services in 2023. This number is down from 2022. The more significant difference between 2022 and 2023 is that most of the calls are occurring between the hours of 8:00 am and 8:00 pm. Many of the on-call staff are working out of town or commuting to and from work during these hours.


The department is seeing an increase in calls occurring simultaneously between 8 am to 8 pm. Last year the department responded to 133 calls which occurred at the same time. 15% of the time the department had multiple crews and apparatus responding to calls.

There were 642 emergency medical calls and 274 fire calls last year. This number includes 111 calls for mutual aid from our neighboring communities. Loudon received mutual aid 20 times from our neighbors.

The department had eleven calls last year that involved carbon monoxide incidents. 8 of the incidents involved actual elevated levels of carbon monoxide.

In 2023 the average response time was 1 minute 46 seconds. The average response time from dispatch until arrival on scene was 7 minutes 59 seconds.

- 70% of our calls were Rescue or EMS
- 5% were for actual fires



- 7.5% were for false alarms
- 6.6% were service calls
- 5.35% were to investigate hazardous conditions
- 5.2% were good intent calls

The remaining calls were for special events, explosions, overpressure or rupture of pressure vessels, severe weather, and natural disasters.

The department responded to 47 motor vehicle accidents with one resulting in a fatality.

The following are towns that the Loudon Fire Department responded to for mutual aid:

- Barnstead 4
- Boscawen 3
- Canterbury 34
- Chichester 29
- Concord 25
- Epsom 6
- Gilmanton 6

Another big part of what we do is code enforcement and building inspections. Last year the department issued 517 various permits. This number does not include the many hours spent conducting plan reviews or multiple inspections required for each of these permits. There will be a complete breakdown of permits issued in the annual town report. A sampling of the permits issued includes:

- 301 mechanical
- 7 new residential
- 1 new commercial
- 33 accessory structure
- 23 solar

The Loudon Fire Department has been training and researching the emerging threat of fires generated by lithium-ion batteries. Lithium-ion battery technology is changing rapidly and the prominence of them in everyday life is becoming greater all the time. In more urban areas the rate of fires involving lithium-ion batteries is ever increasing.

Fortunately, here in NH, we have not seen the same numbers of fires as in other parts of the country. However, we realize the reality of the potential and we have put a lot of energy and time into training our personnel and trying to make the best-informed decisions on purchasing the proper equipment to handle these situations.

We understand that our approach to these types of fires will be much different than other fires. Sometimes there will be minimal effort applied to extinguishment. It may be better to let the fire burn if there are no lives or additional property threatened by the device or vehicle burning. It has been determined that oftentimes the best approach is to try and remove the battery or vehicle from any struc-



tures and allow it to burn itself out.

Once a lithium-ion battery is on fire or in a thermal runaway situation there is virtually no chance to extinguish the fire. When completely submerged or buried in soil the batteries will continue to generate heat and continue to burn or degrade until there is nothing left. It is also important for everyone to understand that the gases emitted from a lithium-ion battery, which is in a thermal runaway situation, or on fire, are highly toxic.

In confined spaces lithium-ion batteries can become explosive. If you encounter one of these situations keep yourself clear from the smoke or visible gas and reduce any opportunity of inhalation.


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## Loudon Selectmen's Minutes

Chief Blanchette would like permission from the Board to proceed with the application. The Board of Selectmen gave Chief Blanchette permission to proceed with the application.

c. Chief Blanchette said applied they for the Firefighters Forest assistance grant and they were awarded \$2,000 in funds for equipment. The way the grant works is that the Loudon Fire Department must match the \$2,000. That money is always in the forest fire budget. The equipment they are looking to buy is 8 forestry helmets, 4 pair of fire-resistant pants, 4 set of fire-resistant shirts, 4 sets of backpacks, 20 pair of gloves, 2 fire racks, hose, valves, and nozzles. To start the purchase of this Chief Blanchette needs the municipality order form filled out. Chairman Maxfield stated the Board would get back to him with the form because they would like to read it first.

d. Chief Blanchette stated that the previous night they had graduation at the Fire Academy. Chief Blanchette is pleased to announce that firefighter Eric Tucker and Chris Warren have graduated.

e. Chief Blanchette said there is a lot of culvert issues happening right now. He is doing the best he can to get some assistance to

move these issues along.

IX. The Board met with Road Agent Russ pearl.

a. Road Agent Russ Pearl said due to the rain they had to unclog some culverts and there has been some trees down they had to get cleaned up.

b. Road Agent Russ Pearl said he had to close Old Shaker Rd. temporarily due to flooding but will reopen it as soon as possible.

a. Police Lieutenant Flanders said we my see some increased highway patrol looking for drunk drivers at night. This will continue now until the end of January.

He chose this area because the town maintains this area, and thre is a place to put trash and public restrooms. Nick Gelinas said his plan is to go before the Eagle Board next month and get all the fine details and then return to Board of Selectmen with all the information. The Board of Selectmen told Nick Gelinas he could work with Russ Pearl. Russ Pearl will show him what can and cannot be done. Tessa said she knows that is not a town issue but a state issue. The issue she has is that they are not willing to do anything about that until next year. She is wondering if the town can help pump out the extra water. Chief Blanchette stated they would have to contact DES and DOT and see what they can do about pressuring them to do something about now. He stated pumping is going to cost a lot of money and it won't solve the problem because in the spring it will be right back to the way it is now. Senator

Pearl and Senator Moffett are now involved as well. Russ Pearl said he is speaking with DES and DOT and he also removed a beaver dam that will help bring some of the water down and help with the L

flow. Chairman Maxfield stated that Selectmen Storrs will call Senator Pearl and the morning and see what news he has. Chairman Maxfield stated they are trying to help them in this flooding problem.

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
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
