

CLERKS' CORNER

When residents come into the Town Clerk's Office to register a vehicle, license a dog or purchase a resident sticker for use at the transfer station or Town Beach, many have no idea what to expect Here's a quick run-down.

<u>Vehicle registration</u>: Residents who come into the office to register a new vehicle are often shocked by the amount they must pay. State law defines how the town and the state will calculate their respective rates for vehicle registration. Those processes are described in the paragraphs below. To get an estimate of what it will cost to register your specific vehicle, you can use the online cost estimator available at Loudonnh.org.

If you purchase a current year or next year's model vehicle, you are going to be paying the highest rate at \$18.00 per thousand of the original manufacturer's list price. That rate applies to the first full 12 months of ownership. This means that if you come in and only register for 6 months, when you return in your birth month to renew the registration, you will pay the-remaining 6 months at \$18.00 per thousand rate. The additional 6 months will be charged at \$15.00 per thousand. This rate will continue to decrease each year by \$3.00 per thousand until the lowest rate is reached. The rate of \$3.00 per thousand will apply to any vehicle model that is five years old or older.

<u>Please see RSA 261:153 for additional information regarding the town portion</u>

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The state rate is determined by the vehicle's gross weight as shown in the following list:

0-3000 pounds gross vehicle weight \$31.20 (2.60 per month)

3001-5000 pounds gross vehicle weight \$43.20 (\$3.60 per month)

5000-8000 pounds gross vehicle weight \$55.20 (\$4.60 per month)

8001-73,280 pounds gross vehicle weight \$0.96 per hundred pounds gross weight

Keep in mind that we are unable to process the state portion of registration costs for vehicles weighing 26,001 lbs. or more. To complete the registration process, you will need to complete the town portion of the registration FIRST, then go to the state Division of Motor Vehicles to complete the process.

<u>Please see RSA 261:141 for more information regarding the state portion</u>

<u>Dog licensing:</u> All dogs must be registered by the end of May. Added fees will begin in June for unregistered dogs.

<u>Transfer station/resident permit stickers:</u> Stickers for use at the transfer station and town beach at Clough Pond are now available in the Town Clerk's Office.

<u>Convenience fees</u>: Please keep in mind that fees for any transaction that is paid by credit card is subject to a convenience fee of 2.99% of your total and will be added to the charge at the time of transaction.

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












1/4 tsp. cream of tartar

1 cup sugar

1 3oz. pkg. strawberry gelatin

1 1/4 cups boiling water

1cup sliced strawberries

1 cup whipping cream

Prepare meringue shell: Have egg whites at room temperature. Add vanilla, cream of tartar and dash of salt. Beat till frothy. Gradually add sugar, a little at a time, beating until very stiff peaks form and sugar is dissolved. Spoon into lightly greased 9 in. pie plate and shape into the shell, swirling sides high. Bake at 275 degrees for 1 hour. Turn off heat and let dry in oven with door closed; at least 2 hours.

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Chill until consistency of an unbeaten egg white. Fold in strawberries and whipped cream. Chill until mixture mounds slightly when spooned. Pile into meringue shell. Chill 4 to 6 hours or overnight. Garnish with whipped cream and strawberry halves.

Strawberry- Chocolate Tart

Crust: 14 chocolate cream filled sandwich cookies

3/4 cup pecans, chopped

2 T. melted butter

Filling: ½ tsp. unflavored gelatin

2/3 cup heavy cream

1 pkg. (3 oz.) cream cheese at room temp. 8 oz. white baking chocolate, coarsely chopped

2 cups strawberries

Garnish: White chocolate curls fresh mint sprigs

In a food processor, finely chop cookies and pecans. Add melted butter and pulse until crumbs begin to hold together. Press mixture over bottom and up sides of 9" tart pan with removable bottom. Refrigerate while preparing filling.

Filling: Sprinkle gelatin over cream in small bowl. Let stand until gelatin is softened, about 5 min. With electric mixer, beat cream cheese in medium bowl until smooth. Transfer to small saucepan. Add white chocolate; cook, stirring over medium heat until gelatin is dissolved, chocolate is melted and mixture is smooth, about 4 min. Pour into tart crust. Refrigerate 1 ½ hrs. or until firm.

Hull strawberries, rinse. Halve some of berries. Remove side of tart pan. Mound strawberries in center of tart. Garnish with chocolate curls and mint sprigs.

Easy no bake Strawberry Truffle

3 cups fresh strawberries

2 T. sugar

1 pkg. instant vanilla pudding mix

2 cups milk

1 regular loaf cake, sliced into 10 ½ in. slices

1/4 cup strawberry jam

Combine berries and sugar in a medium sized bowl and stir to mix well. Set aside for 20 min. to allow berries to soften with the sugar. Prepare the pudding according to pkg. directions. Spread 1 side of each cake slice with a thin layer of jam. Arrange half the slices over the bottom of a 3 qt. trifle bowl or clear glass mixing bowl. Then add half the pudding and half the fruit with sugar. Repeat the layers, cake slices, pudding and fruit mixture. Do the topping last.

Topping: Lightly fold together: 3/4 cup whipped topping (ie. Cool whip or real whipped cream) and 3/4 cup French vanilla yogurt. Spread lightly over the top Best if chilled for 2 hrs. before serving.

Marbled Rhubarb Orange Bread

1 3/4 cups rhubarb, cut into 1/2 "pieces

2 T. flour

1/4 cup wheat germ

1/4 cup finely chopped pecans

½ cup brown sugar

½ tsp. cinnamon grated

rind of one orange

3/4 cup sugar

2 T. shortening

juice of one orange

1 egg

2 ½ cup flour

2 tsp. baking powder

1/4 tsp. baking soda

½ tsp. salt

1 cup buttermilk

Toss pieces of rhubarb with 2 T. flour to coat. Set aside. In a small bowl combine wheat germ, chopped pecans, brown sugar and. In a large bowl stir grated orange rind into sugar. Add shortening and mix thoroughly. To this mixture add orange juice and egg. Mix well. Sift flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt together and add to the batter in the large bowl, mixing alternately with buttermilk until batter is smooth. Fold in rhubarb pieces. Spoon half the batter into a greased and floured 9x5 loaf pan. Sprinkle with 3/4 of the wheat germ mixture. Spoon in remaining batter. Top with remaining wheat germ mixture. Draw a knife through the batter several times to create marbling. Bake at 350 degrees for about 60 min, or until loaf tests done. Cool completely before serving. Tastes better the second day.

Rhubarb Crunch

Combine 4 cups rhubarb cut into 1 in. pieces ½ cup sugar 1 T. flour and 1 tsp. shredded orange peel. Turn into an 8" pie pan.

For topping, combine $\frac{3}{4}$ cup flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ cup brown sugar and dash salt. Cut in $\frac{1}{4}$ cup butter until crumbly. Sprinkle over rhubarb. Bake at 350 degrees for 40-45 min.

Serve warm with topping: combine $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sour cream, 2 T. XX sugar and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. vanilla.

"When In Doubt, STAY OUT!"

The Clough Pond Association would like to congratulate Clough Pond resident Curt Darling for being the recipient of the 2023 Statewide Volunteer Limnologist Award for his over 1000 hours and 25 years of volunteer service to Clough Pond. Curt was the first volunteer to sample the Pond's water in 1985 and was trained by Jody Conner, for whom the NHDES Limnology Center is now named. Huge thanks to Curt for your years of volunteering for such an important task.

Things are in place for a relaxing and safe summer at Clough Pond. The dam at the NH Fish & Game boat launch has been cleared and spruced up (Thank You Fish & Game) and our friendly and informative Lake Hosts are prepared to greet you at the boat ramp! Our Weed Watchers have their paddleboards and kayaks at the ready and our Volunteer Lake Assessment Program team has already scheduled dates to sample the Pond's water.

We would love to add more Lake Hosts to our roster so if you are looking for outdoor part time work this summer, please contact our Lake Host Coordinator, Perry Hayden at hayden1987@gmail.com. Lake Host positions are paid \$12.00+ hourly and scheduled in four-hour shifts with openings seven days a week. These hours are great for retired folks or college students looking to pick up extra spending money or perhaps earn credit hours. Go to www.cloughpondnh.org/lake-host for more details.

Last summer brought an increase in people noticing cyanobacteria blooms throughout NH's waterbodies and Clough Pond was no exception. The NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) is working feverishly and learning more each year about what cyanobacteria are, what impacts its growth, how it affects you and what can be done to minimize its impact.

Cyanobacteria are capable of producing toxins known to target the liver and central nervous system of animals and people and can cause irritations to the skin and mucous membranes, so it is best to NOT come in contact with this substance and to especially keep young children, pets and livestock away.

There is one important thing YOU can do to help protect your loved ones this summer. Familiarize yourself with the updated NHDES website where they have vast amounts of information on how to recognize a cyanobacteria bloom, who to call if you think you see one, and best of all, it contains a "Healthy Swimming Mapper" indicating which NH water bodies are known to have current cyanobacteria blooms, as well as an opportunity to sign up for alerts. https://www4.des.state.nh.us/NHEnvironmentalDashboard/

Cyanobacteria blooms can happen on any day of the week but if it happens on a weekend, when the NHDES Lab is not open for water testing, you need to perform what the State calls a "Personal Risk Assessment" BEFORE entering the water. It is often difficult to identify cyanobacteria because it frequently morphs into different colors or shapes and locations depending on the water's movement. Be sure to take a picture of it for future identification and report it on

the NHDES website's new Bloom Report page.

So if you're not sure what you're looking at is cyanobacteria..."WHEN IN DOUBT – STAY OUT!"

Remember Go to the NHDES website to take advantage of their resources and to become knowledgeable about the water you want to enjoy, so you can keep your two legged and four legged loved ones safe!

In April 2023 Loudon Food Pantry gave out enough food to 279 individuals for them to prepare 6,120 meals. Of these people, 157 were aged 60 and older (56%), 52 were aged 18 or under (19%), and 70 were between those ages (25%). Also, 17 new individuals came to get food at the pantry.

A Glimpse into the Historical Society - By Liz LeBrun

Some things we've collected in the Historical Society Museum are not beautiful, not particularly valuable and not very interesting to look at. Our ancestors made some things as simple as possible to perform a job that needed doing. All the above, applies to our sounding board. The sounding board looks like a huge cutting board measuring 13" x 24". It is just a plain piece of wood with rounded corners. Probably most visitors will pass by it without even noticing it because we have some other smaller things piled on top of it. Sounding boards go back to the mid eighteenth century, but we estimate ours dates back to 1900.

A sounding board is installed above or in back of a podium to keep the sound contained so the voice of the speaker is projected out toward the audience. Churches commonly made use of sounding boards and many were very ornate. Today the sounding board is replaced with microphones and expensive technology. It is not clear where our sounding board was mounted. A sounding board is also called a tester or abat-voix, meaning "it beats the sound down". That seems like quite a fancy name for something so simple. A sounding board can also refer to a person you have chosen to bounce ideas off of. Could be talking to this piece of wood might be just as helpful.

Carl B. Temple





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

- b. Chief Blanchette said everyone on the department is currently healthy.
- c. Chief Blanchette said A2 was out of service for eight days last week but is now back in service. Chief Blanchette said ambulance 1 will be out of service next week for repairs. Chief Blanchette said Engine 2 will be out for work and waiting on the appointment. Chief Blanchette said Car 1 was serviced at Banks yesterday for routine maintenance. Chief Blanchette said Tanker 1 has a crack in the water tank and he is working with the manufacturer to get it repaired. Chief Blanchette said the crack is in the same place that was repaired 5 or 6 years ago.
- d. Chief Blanchette said both backup generators at both stations will receive their spring preventative maintenance next week and Capital Alarm will be in to do annual fire alarm inspections.
- e. Chief Blanchette said Brady Leonard, Sara Lewis, Nathan Ecker and Sean Marden have all completed their NH Fire Academy All Apparatus Driver Operator Program and we are now just waiting for their written test results. Chief Blanchette said they will be working on driving time. Chief Blanchette said it was at basically no cost to the town except the fuel to get them to the program.
- f. Chief Blanchette said they have been pretty busy in the Code Enforcement Office and they are currently working with three sets of plans, inspections have been picking up. Chief Blanchette said the weather has played a factor with contractors and completing work and inspections.

- g. Chief Blanchette said there have been quite a few land use complaints. Chief Blanchette said he expects there to be an update on the letter that was included in the consent agenda at the May 16th meeting.
- h. Chief Blanchette said there will be a Hazard Mitigation Committee meeting May 30th at 10am to review the final form and create a prioritized list for the next five years.
- i. Chief Blanchette said he has been working with Mr. Wilson on getting the spring cleanup done on the town cemeteries and it has been completed as of yesterday. Chief Blanchette said depending on rain they will start mowing late next week. Chief Blanchette said he would like to set up a work session with the Selectmen at the Moore Cemetery to look at the future layout of the back section and discuss a plan.
- IV. The Board met with Bill Heinz from Boscawen. Mr. Heinz said he is here to discuss a financial situation that he discovered with the District and Andover and the contract that is to expire in 2024. Mr. Heinz said the new agreement was voted on and passed at the annual meeting. Mr. Heinz said he is asking for support from the cooperative district towns.
