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



SPRING WEATHER:

We repeat this every year as a friendly reminder:

No person shall enter or remain on any parcel of land owned by the Town of Loudon or Merrimack Valley School District between the hours of 10:30 pm. And 5:00 a.m. unless approved by the Board of Selectmen or proper authorization from the Merrimack Valley School District. (Loudon Town Ordinance)

With the nicer weather here, you will also see children out on their bicycles, skateboards, etc. Please use extra caution and slow down. Remember bicycle helmets are required for any child under the age of 16.

The recreation fields are seeing increased activity as the sports season is in full swing. Please use respect while visiting and using the fields. If you see anything suspicious, we strongly encourage you to contact us at 603-228-1631. Please remove any trash when you leave (there are dumpsters at the fields).

Clough Pond Beach – a resident sticker is required while using the beach. The sticker can be purchased at the Loudon Transfer Station during normal business hours.

Alcohol is prohibited on town owned property.

MAJOR EVENTS:

We recently had our kickoff meeting for the traffic control planning with local, state and federal agencies for the upcoming Nascar race which is scheduled for June 22 & 23, 2024. This event will be immediately following Motorcycle Week in the area. Stay tuned for more information next month as we get closer to the event.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

In the last few months, we have taken a few reports from the FAA regarding lasers being pointed at planes flying over Loudon. We will continue to work closely with Federal agencies when we receive these reports.

Laser strikes on aircraft remain a serious threat to aviation safety. Intentionally aiming lasers at aircraft's poses a safety threat to pilots and violates federal law. Many high-powered lasers can incapacitate pilots flying aircraft that may be carrying hundreds of passengers.

The FAA works closely with federal, state and local law enforcement agencies to pursue civil and criminal penalties against people who purposely aim a laser at an aircraft. The agency takes enforcement action against people who violate Federal Aviation Regulations by shining lasers at aircraft and can impose civil penalties of up to \$11,000 per violation. The FAA has imposed civil penalties up to \$30,800 against people for multiple laser incidents.






Paul Wainwright will present a program on New England's Colonial Meetinghouses on Wed, May 1 at 6:30 pm. The program will be presented at the Loudon Community Building, "Charlie's Barn" located at 29 South Village Rd.

Paul Wainwright is a New Hampshire author, photographer,

and historian. He has researched the history of many town meetinghouses throughout New Hampshire and New England. Photographs of these buildings that remain in our communities will be shared with his audience as well as the stories behind the building and the communities that built them. In many instances these meetinghouses were dual purpose buildings serving as places where residents discussed town business and also held Sunday worship services. Wainwright will examine how these buildings were community centers and helped shape early New Hampshire communities. This program is free and open to the public. The event is made possible by a grant from the NH Humanities.

The Yoke. What stories does it conjure? The yoke was first mentioned in a Greek play in the 5th century BC (ours is not that old). Jump ahead and imagine it is the mid 1800's and the farmer next door has just finished up sugaring season. Every day he yoked his oxen to draw the wagon carrying the sap collection barrel from tree to tree and then back to the sap house. Now that spring is here and planting season approaches, he will yoke his oxen to plow the fields to ready them for planting. We saw that he also used his yoke of oxen to work on the road in front of his house. A landowner can receive a credit of 75 cents per day on his taxes if he worked on the road with either his yoke of oxen or his plow. In fact, Article 10 in the town report sometime around 1860 said that Cyrus Green in his capacity as Highway Surveyor was not satisfied with doing work on his own road so he "rushed" to the main road without giving the landowners who lived there any opportunity to work. It was stated that he "filched" from them the right to labor so that he could obtain the credits for himself. Back to today and we find that the days of oxen working the farms and fixing the roads are gone. Also gone are the sights of oxen drawing carts westward, working in logging operations and helping to build railroads. Today oxen have been replaced by tractors and various other types of machinery.

Today you might enjoy seeing a yoke of oxen in pulling contests at the fairs. Hopkinton State Fair boasts 107 years of pulling contests. The oxen draw loads 6 feet and depending on the size of the animals and the age of the handler or teamster, the load can start at up to 1050 pounds. Oxen are male cattle trained from an early age to work in pairs. You may hear the teamster yelling, "Step up" (go forward), "Gee" (turn right), "Haw" (turn left), "Whoa" (stop) or "Back" (back up). While farmers may have also yoked donkeys or horses, the strength and endurance of an ox is superior.

You may still be unclear about the yoke. A yoke is a wooden beam hooked between two animals to enable them to pull together. The closer together they are, the stronger they are as a unit. There are different kinds of yokes but ours is a bow yoke which sits on the neck with the head fitting through u-shaped pieces transmitting force from the shoulders of the animals. The yoke was given to the Historical Society Museum by Susan Sanborn Wheeler and was used by her father Albin Sanborn as well as her grandfather John Sanborn. Also displayed in the picture is a hitch bar hanging in front of the yoke on the left side. This yoke was likely involved in doing a lot of work in Loudon over the years and deserves its place in our museum.

Please come to visit the museum on the first or third Wednesday of each month from 1-3pm. We are also sponsoring a free public program on May 1 at 6:30 pm in the community room of Charlie's Barn. This program is made possible from a NH Humanities grant and features speaker Paul Wainwright talking about New England's Colonial Meetinghouses.

What's Cookin Food, Food and More Food!

Recipes this month are potluck. Things that sounded good as I scanned through cookbooks.

Swiss Vegetable Medley

1 (16 oz.) bag frozen broccoli, carrots and cauliflower, thawed and drained

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 cup shredded Swiss cheese

1/3 c. sour cream

1/4 tsp. black pepper

1 (4 oz.) jar chopped pimiento, drained

(optional) 1 can (2.8 oz.) Durkee French fried onions

Combine vegetables, soup, ½ cheese, sour cream, pepper, pimiento, and ½ can fried onions. Pour into a 1 qt. casserole and bake, covered, for 30 min. at 350 degrees. Top with remaining cheese and onions and bake for 5 min., uncovered.

Zesty Chicken Mushroom Soup

½ lb. fresh mushrooms, chopped

1/4 cup each chopped carrots, onions and celery

½ c. butter, cubed

½ c. flour

5 ½ c. chicken broth

1 tsp. pepper

1/4 tsp thyme

pinch dried tarragon

1/2 tsp. hot pepper sauce

3 c. half and half 2 ½ c. cubed chicken

1 T. minced parsley

1 ½ tsp. lemon juice

½ tsp. salt

Saute onions, celery, carrots and mushrooms until tender. Stir in flour until blended. Add broth and seasonings. Mix well. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, simmer, uncovered for 10 min. Stir in the cream, chicken, parsley, lemon juice and salt. Heat through but do not boil.

Seafood Au Gratin

4 T. butter, divided

2 T. flour

1/8 tsp. pepper

1 cup chicken broth

½ cup milk

½ cup grated Parmesan cheese, divided

½ lb. sea scallops

1 lb. haddock, cut into six pieces

1 ½ cup sliced, fresh mushrooms

2 T, butter

1/2 cup shredded Mozzarella cheese

½ cup shredded cheddar cheese

In a large saucepan, melt 2 T. butter. Stir in the flour and pepper until smooth. Gradually add the broth and milk. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 min or until thickened. Stir in 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese; set

aside. Place scallops in another saucepan, cover with water. Simmer uncovered for 4-5 min. Meanwhile, place haddock in a shallow 2 qt. microwave dish. Cover and microwave on high for 2-4 min. Drain scallops. Arrange fish and scallops in a greased 7x11 baking dish. In a small skillet, saute mushrooms in remaining butter until tender. Stir into cheese sauce. Spoon over seafood and sprinkle with mozzarella, cheddar and remaining Parmesan. Cover and bake at 350 degrees 15-20 min or until bubbly ad cheese is melted.

Zesty Baked Carrots

5-6 cups sliced carrots (about 2 lbs.) 6 slices Swiss cheese

Sauce: 1 small onion, minced

4 T. butter

3 T. flour

1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. chili powder

2 cups milk

Topping: 1 cup soft bread crumbs 2 T. butter, melted 5 strips of bacon, cooked and crumbled

Blanch the carrots until crisp -tender. Layer in a shallow 2 qt, baking dish with ½ the cheese. Repeat the layers. For sauce, saute onion in butter, blend in flour and seasonings. Cook and stir for 1 min. Add milk all at once and stir until thickened. Pour over cheese. Combine crumbs and butter and sprinkle over all. Top with bacon. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 min.

Spicy Nut Bread

1 cup milk

1 egg, beaten

1/4 cup shortening, melted

2 cups flour

3 tsp. baking powder

1/4 cup sugar

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. each cinnamon, nutmeg and salt / $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. cloves

1/2 cup pecans

Mix together milk and egg, add shortening. Sift together dry ingredients. Add shortening mixture to dry mixture. Mix well. Add pecans and mix gently. Bake at 325 degrees for 25 min.

Spice Cake

1 cup sugar, ½ cup butter, 1 egg, 1 cup sour milk, 1 tsp. soda, 2 cups flour, ½ cup chopped raisins, 1 tsp. cinnamon, ½ tsp. allspice and cloves a little nutmeg

Cream sugar and butter. Add egg, sour milk with soda, raisins, flour and all spices. Mix well and place in a greased bread pan. Bake 40 min at 350 degrees.



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As of April 12th, the Loudon Fire Department has responded to 313 calls for service. We have had two major winter storms which have caused a significant number of trees and utilities to come down. These events were both long-term multi-day events which called for extensive coordination of town and partner resources to keep the roads open and restore utilities.

When these incidents occur, we typically open our Emergency Operations Center at Station 2 on Clough Hill which allows us to utilize Station 1 as a warming center. Both stations are equipped with backup generators to maintain operations. Both stations have extensive communications equipment to facilitate and coordinate emergency operations throughout the town. Much of this equipment has been secured over time by applying for and obtaining FEMA or NH HSEM Emergency Planning Grants by using the towns Hazard Mitigation Plan and Emergency Operations Plan.

The town's Hazard Mitigation Plan was approved by FEMA and adopted by the selectmen last April. Our Emergency Operations Plan has just expired, and we are now in the process of updating and re-writing a new one for submission to FEMA for approval.

During the April winter storm over 20 members of the department worked over the course of two days to assist in storm emergency operations. Many of these members took time off from their regular jobs to assist the community. This is almost always at a lower hourly

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rate than they normally earn at their regular job. Most firefighters are only making \$12.95 per hour as a call member. We thank them immensely for their dedication and support in assisting their community even if it means a personal financial loss or loss of earned time off. Their sense of community should never be placed in question with this level of commitment.

Ambulance 2, the 2014 International, has recently been out of service more than it has been in service. It has almost 9000 hours on it and over 130,000 miles. We voted to replace this unit during town meeting 2023 and it was approved by the voters. A new ambulance was placed on order at an estimated cost of \$280,000, with no equipment. The fire department still cannot obtain a chassis manufacture date for the new unit. Many other public safety agencies around the country and the immediate area are having the same issue. Currently Ambulance 2 has been out of service for 22 days in the last two months and is out of service again. The current total for repairs is \$10,955.03. The cost for current repairs is unknown.

The department typically has multiple calls occurring at the same time. Statistics show that multiple calls occur 15% of the time. Loudon relies on mutual aid ambulances to meet the needs for second or simultaneous calls. We will still send first responders or an engine company to provide aid until the mutual aid ambulance can arrive.

We will be encouraging the Capital Improvement Plan committee to move up the replacement schedule on the ambulances from 10 years to 8 years to address the increase in call volumes and the lag time from time from placing an order for a new ambulance to the actual date of delivery of the unit.

The fire department would like to congratulate Brady Leonard on being appointed Deputy Forest Fire Warden for the Town of Loudon. Brady will now have the authority and responsibility to issue fire permits, inspect outside fires, and be a team leader during wildfire suppression efforts. He will work under the supervision of the Forest Fire Warden and NH State Forest Fire Ranger for this district.

We also wish to congratulate Lt. Matthew LaDuke on obtaining the NH State Emergency Services Instructor certification for Emergency Medical Service Programs. This was a large commitment on his part to obtain this certification on his own time and at his own expense.

Patrick Starkey has also just completed the Firefighter I & II certification program and the Hazardous Materials Awareness and Operations certifications. Patrick took these programs online and traveled at his own expense to Texas for 3 weeks. Patrick also attended boot camp as well as participating in practical and written exams. The department appreciates the level of personal dedication and commitment of each of these individuals who serve our community.

Jason A. "Jay" Johnpier






Durrell K. Smith

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

JESSICA KIRBY MEMORIAL TRAILS

The Jessica Kirby Tract donated by the Kirby Family Trust 247 Lovejoy Road, Loudon NH Parking for the Jessica Kirby Trails is located at the Lovejoy Trails parking lot at 234 Lovejoy Road, a short walking distance of 200 feet away. No parking is allowed near the Jessica Kirby kiosk or within the entrance trail.

In 2022, the Kirby Family Trust graciously donated to the Town of Loudon a 15-acre tract of land in memory of their daughter Jessica Kirby, specifying that walking trails be created on the property. Volunteers for the Conservation Commission's Trails Subcommittee began development in 2022 and opened it to the public in November 2023.


Once part of a large farm, the woodlot now known as the Jessica Kirby Tract abutted fields which were subject to seasonal flooding from the Hunting Swamp and another wetland to the west. To drain water so that crops could be grown, farmers dug a large ditch, starting from the wetland and just beyond the fields, and a smaller ditch within the woodlot, allowing water from the fields to flow into the Pine Island Brook.

The entrance to the trails passes through the open field, bordered by houses and property boundary signs, and continues through an opening in the woods. From there, over a mile and a half of walking trails through woodland and open areas can be accessed. A picnic table sits near the main footbridge, and many blueberry bushes can be found all along the Aqua and Pink Trails.

Volunteers for the Conservation Commission Trails Subcommittee donated over 700 man-hours to the construction of the trails and footbridges. Approximately 61% of the material costs were paid with federal American Recovery Plan (Covid-19) funds. 27% of the costs were donated by individuals, and 12% came from the Conservation Commission budget. A second bridge over another section of the large ditch is planned to be constructed in the spring of 2024.

Benches on some trails will be added, as well.

The Conservation Commission and its Trails Subcommittee would like to thank Sandra Blanchard, Russ Pearl, David Ives, and others for their donations to the trail development.



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

Old Business

- Discussed extending library hours to include opening on Mondays, maybe even doing part time hours on a Friday and part time hours on Mondays. Discussion among trustees and staff about hours. Friday patrons will be tracked and also compared with children's program numbers. Christina Finemore thought about possibly doing another children's program on Monday AM due to large numbers. New Trustee Amy Corliss mentioned looking at the holiday calendar as well. Another part time person would be added on Mondays if there were to be open hours.
- Discussed use of a small multi-use room off of the children's library room downstairs. Natasha Perron, a part time employee and member of the public, had concerns about traffic outside the room. Natasha proposed putting Maker's Space materials in there for set hours and borrowing a 3D printer from the state library. 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

Election Reminder:

This September's election is a primary election, when the parties elect their nominees for state and federal offices to appear on the November general election ballot.

This means that during the primary election, registered Republicans can only receive a ballot for the Republican primary; and likewise registered Democrats can only receive a ballot for the Democratic primary. Voters who are registered "Undeclared" can declare a party affiliation on election day and request the corresponding ballot.

Please take a moment, at your convenience, to review the checklist of voters. It is on display in the lobby of the Town Offices (55 South Village Rd), it is in a white 3-ring binder on the table in the lobby. Or you can review your party affiliation online at the Secretary of State's website (https://app.sos.nh.gov/voterinformation).

You can change your party affiliation with the Town Clerk anytime during normal business hours. June 4th, 2024 will be your last chance to do so ahead of the September election.

Loudon Selectmen's Minutes

Selectmen's Meeting Minutes Tuesday March 19, 2024

Present: Chairman Miller, Selectman Maxfield and Selectman Gilman

Also present, Fire Chief Tom Blanchette, Road Agent Russ Pearl, and Town Administrator Brenda Pearl

- I. Chairman Maxfield called the meeting to order at 6:00pm
- II. Pledge of Allegiance was led by Chairman Maxfield.
- III. Chaiman Maxfield stated they needed to designate a new chairman. Chairman Maxfield nominated Selectman Miller to be the new chairman. Motion was seconded by Selectman Gilman. All in favor. Motion carried.
- IV. Chairman Miller made a motion to accept the consent agenda as listed. Motin seconded by Selectman Gilman. All in favor. Motion carried.
- V. Selectman Gilman made a motion to appoint Jeffrey C Miller to Planning Board Ex Officio on March 19th, 2024. This term shall expire March 21st, 2025. Motion seconded by Selectman Maxfield. All in favor. Motion carried.
- VI. The Board met with Fire Chief Tom Blanchette:
- a. Chief Blanchette stated that code enforcement had to deal with a citizen who had issues with the Oak Hill cell towers and the fact people have been trespassing. Chief Blanchette stated that someone did cut the lock off the state-owned gate. Chief Blanchette did contact the state and it was fixed Tuesday morning. The state is currently working on plans with the power lines and the easement that goes with it. Chief Blanchette suggested the gentleman contact the state with these questions.
- b. Chief Blanchette said he did speak with the owner at 7163 School Street, and they discussed a plan on how to come into compliance. Chief Blanchette feels it is a reasonable timeline. Chairman Miller agrees and would like to get something on paper and signed by Tree Fellas and the Select Board. Chief stated that he was not served a letter, but he did have a verbal conversation with him. Selectman Miller asked Chief Blanchette to draft up a letter.
- c. Chief Blanchette said ambulance 2 has been out of service for 2 weeks now. It is awaiting repair at a shop.
- d. Chief Blanchette stated that last week was the kickoff for Nascar planning.
- e. Chief Blanchette said last Thursday they had their first traffic control plan at DOT. It will be Bike week and Nascar on the same weekend, but they plan to have a handle on things, so everything runs smoothly.

f. Chief Blanchette stated last Thursday morning he attended Cordially Central NH Regional Emergency Planning Meeting. They are required to belong to this committee to apply for grants. This committee helps identify hazardous materials. They are currently lacking industry partners so if there are any businesses in

Loudon that use hazardous materials Chief Blanchette invites them to contact him so he can get them involved in the process.

- g. Chief Blanchette said they did have a fire on 106 N just prior to Loudon Ridge Road on Monday morning. There was no injury, but it did take a full building fire response. The Chief would like to thank all the towns who helped.
- h. Chief Blanchette stated that he would like to make Brady Leonard a Deputy Forest Fire Warden for the town of Loudon. The Board of Selectmen signed the appointment paper.
- VII. The Board met with Road Agent Russ pearl.
- a. Road Agent Russ Pearl said the grader has been out all week working on the roads. Chad is doing a great job.
- b. Road Agent Russ Pearl said he is looking to get 4 to 5 bids on reclaiming and paving from North Village Road to Flagg Road. Bids need to be in by 4pm on April 16th, 2024.
- c. Road Agent Russ Pearl stated that he received two bids to take care of 4 to 5 trees that need to come down on Oak Hill Road. He received one bid from Magoon and the other from Tree Fellas. The board decided to go with the lower bid. Chairman Miller made a motion to accept Tree Fellas, LLC bid for \$6,500. Motion seconded by Selectman Gilman. All in favor. Motion carried.
- VIII. The Board reviewed new business:
- a. Selectmen Maxfield stated they received a request to waive a building permit application fee. They were unable to meet the timeline, so they must apply again. He was wondering if he could just use the initial payment to cover the second application. The Board of Selectmen stated that he would have to pay the fee again since that is what is stated on the permit application.
- b. Selectmen Maxfield stated they received a letter from Judith A. Joy requesting she be reimbursed the money she paid in interest on taxes. She was away on vacation and the letter got bounced around in the mail and therefore she didn't receive it on time. The Board of Selectmen would like to meet with the Tax Collector, Meghan O'Hare to find out what happened before deciding.
- c. Selectman Maxfield stated they had a memo about getting timecards from elected officials. Chaiman Miller stated per the Municipal Association elected officials are not required to submit timecards. Elected officials are paid salary. The Board of Selectmen came to the consensus that they will not require timecards from elected officials, but if they want to submit them they can.
- d. Selectman Maxfield stated they had a Post-Closure Report from DES about the transfer station. They check to make sure everything is being maintained. Selectman Maxfield made a motion to authorize the Chairman to sign the annual Post-Closure Report. Motion seconded by Selectman Gilman. All in favor. Motion carried.

- IX. The Board reviewed Old Business:
- a. The Board of Selectmen reviewed the 5-year city of Concord contract for Prosecution Services for the Police dept. Selectman Gilman made a motion to authorize the Chairman to sign the city of Concord Prosecutor's Office Contract. Motion seconded cy Selectman Maxfield. All in favor. Motion carried.
- b. The Board of Selectman would like to table the Community Power contract. They would like to meet with George Saunderson and the Alternative Energy Committee to go over some information before signing.
- c. The Board of Selectmen have a job description for the Town Administrator. Before it is signed Selectman Gilman is going to review it.
- d. Chairman Miller addressed the Merrimack Valley School District issue with the missing money. Loudon is not going to move forward with town attorneys due to the fact Boscawen already did that. The BOS did not see the point in spending the money if another town had already been pursuing it. It was also noted that the School Board has the authority to do whatever they want without the Legislative Body having to vote on it. Since obtaining all this information Boscawen has since suspended the investigation. The state of NH will not investigate it either.
- e. The Board of Selectmen stated that they are the only ones who approve timecards and overtime.
- X. Important Dates:
- a. Thursday, 3/21/24-7pm-Planning Board meeting
- b. Thursday, 3/28/24-7pm-ZBA meeting
- XI. Selectman Maxfield recognized Alicha Kingsbury of 293 Bear Hill Road; Alicha Kingsbury was inquiring about the timecard memo. Selectman Maxfield stated they asked elected officials to submit timecards so the BOS could make sure they were getting compensated fairly. Alicha Kingsbury stated she felt as though the Board of Selectmen should of sent a letter to the Merrimack Valley School District showing displeasure for the whole situation of the missing money.
- XII. Selectman Maxfield recognized Ryan Laroche of 7161 School St; Ryan Laroche stated he wanted the Board of Selectmen to understand that he feels they are pushing small businesses out of town. He stated that if he cannot make the timeline that is stated in the letter than he will have to go to another town. The Board of Selectmen informed him that there is a process to go through and rules need to be followed.
- XIII. Chairman Miller made a motion at 7:27 pm to adjourn. Motion seconded by Selectmen Gilman. All in favor. Motion carried.

- d. Selectman Maxfield made a motion for Loudon Youth Sports to use the basketball courts 6/1/24-7/31/24 from 5pm-8pm and to authorize the Chairman to sign on behalf of the town of Loudon. Motion seconded by Selectman Gilman. All in favor. Motion carried.
- e. Selectman Gilman made a motion for Loudon Youth Sports to use the t-ball field 4/10/24-5/31/24 from 4:30pm-6pm and to authorize the Chairman to sign on behalf of the town of Loudon. Motion seconded by Selectman Maxfield. All in favor. Motion carried.
- f. Selectman Maxfield made a motion for Loudon Youth Sports to use the Babe Ruth outfield 4/10/24-5/31/24 from 4:30pm-6pm and to authorize the Chairman to sign on behalf of the town of Loudon. Motion seconded by Selectman Gilman. All in favor. Motion carried.
- g. The Board of Selectmen reviewed and signed a new hire application for the Fire Dept. There is no current start date yet.
- h. Selectman Gilman made a motion to accept an ambulance invoice write off request from the Fire Chief for \$115.17. Motion seconded by Selectman Maxfield. All in favor. Motion carried.
- i. Selectman Gilman made a motion to authorize the Chairman to sign the LHS Associates contract for the 6-poll pad bundle with the stand, case, stylist, and printer for \$10,775. Motion seconded by Selectman Maxfield. All in favor. Motion carried.
- VII. The Board reviewed Old Business:
- a. The Board of Selectmen reviewed the request for the tax interest reimbursement. Chairman Miller spoke with the Tax Collector, and it appears to not be Loudon's fault and it was outside the time frame for reimbursement. The Board of Selectmen denied her request.
- b. Chairman Miller addressed an email they received from Alicha Kingsbury. She was inquiring when the opt out of the energy supplier come. Chairman Miller stated a letter will go out at the end of April. Alicha Kingsbury was wondering how an energy supplier was decided upon. Chairman Miller stated they have an Alternative Energy Committee who do all the research and pick the supplier that is best for the town's needs. Alicha also stated in her email that she feels as though the BOS should have sent a letter to the Merrimack School District when the money issue arose. Chairman Miller stated a letter was sent in July of 2023 when they first learned of the situation. Lastly, Alicha Kingsbury asked Chairman Miller if it was his opinion or the Board of Selectmen when the comments were made about her last meeting. Chairman Miller stated it was his own personal comments as a citizen. Chairman Miller is entitled to his 1st Amendment rights.
- c. Chairman Miller addressed a question that came in email from

Terese Bastarache. Terese was wondering about the small tree business on School St. in Loudon. Chairman Miller stated there are rules and laws in planning and zoning and the Selectmen are responsible for upholding those rules and laws. The rules and laws were voted in by the town's people. Chairman Miller stated they are not trying to run any small business out of town, but they do have to follow the rules and regulations and run a business in a commercial zone not residential.

Loudon Zoning Board of Adjustment Regular Meeting Minutes February 22, 2024

Chairman Earl Tuson called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Attendance: Alvin See, Charlie Aznive, Chairman Earl Tuson, Peter Pitman, Alternate Ned Lizotte

Vice Chair Todd Phelps and Alternate Steve Ives were not present. Alternate Ned Lizotte was moved to voting member for the duration of the meeting.

Acceptance of Minutes:

January 25, 2024, Regular Meeting Minutes:

Peter Pitman made a motion to approve the January 25, 2024, Regular Meeting minutes as written. The motion was seconded by Alvin See. All in favor, the motion carried; the minutes were approved.

The Zoning Board hears appeals for rehearings, special exceptions, variances, and administrative appeals. They need to be filed within a timely basis within 45 days of an action. For further information, applicants can see the Loudon Zoning Ordinance, the RSAs, or can stop by the Zoning Office and talk to Lindsey during business hours.

Public Hearings:

Old Business -

Application #Z23-36 Osborne – Map 21 Lot 11 – Variance to allow an auto repair/body shop in the RR District – REHEARING

Applicant Joe Osborne was present. Abutters present included Sid Porter of 24 Plateau Ridge Road, Doug and Judy Hayes of 128 Route 129, and Joe Jackson of 35 Plateau Ridge Road. Meredith Goldstein represented the applicant.

In 2022, a Special Exception was granted to operate as a major home occupation.

Chairman Earl Tuson paused to accept a motion from Alvin See that Application #Z23-36 did not constitute a Development of Regional Impact. The motion was seconded by Peter Pitman. All in favor, the motion carried.

Meredith Goldstein continued to explain that the business was limited by a 5-car parking restriction and needed to return to the Board. The business faces supply chain issues and delays which cause vehicles to remain parked while waiting for parts. Being limited to 5 parking spaces makes business nearly impossible due to the supply chain delays. At the December ZBA meeting, the Board concluded that 4 out of the 5 variance criteria were met.

Chairman Earl Tuson paused for the Board to redetermine if Alvin See should recuse himself. Peter Pitman did not have a problem with Alvin See remaining on the Board as he was not an abutter. Peter Pitman made a motion that Alvin See need not recuse himself. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. All in favor, the motion carried.

Meredith Goldstein continued to discuss criteria 2 of the variance application which related to the spirit of the ordinance. She quoted a letter that she presented to the Board which included guidance from the Supreme Court about variance criteria #1 and #2 being related and intertwined. A conflict did not indicate a violation of the spirit of the ordinance. In terms of the essential character of the property, the Major Home Occupation already exists and during the granting of this special exception, it was ruled that the business was not injurious or detrimental with the criteria that had to be met. The property is on

a major road and is across a commercially zoned property. There is no concern to the general welfare of the public. There are no traffic concerns, there has been no harm to the public in the 18 months since the MHO was granted, and the public benefits from the needed business in Town. Meredith Goldstein said that the property across the street is commercial, and the applicant's property is not viewed as residential in nature. Ned Lizotte shared concerns regarding the Master Plan's designation of C/I properties and how the applicant's property was separated by RR properties from this zone. He was concerned about the work done on the property without a site plan review and the excavation done to make room for parking. He was concerned about steep slopes on the property. Meredith Goldstein said the applicant wanted to move forward in the right way.

Chairman Earl Tuson said that the variance was requested to allow an auto repair/body shop. The MHO that was granted was for truck repair. He wanted to know what additional activities would be performed on site. Meredith Goldstein said that nothing further was being proposed and they used language present in the ordinance. There were not intending to change the business. They did not know about stating a specific number of parking spots because they didn't know what would be needed.

Chairman Earl Tuson said that there had been changes to the property since the Board did the site walk in the fall of 2022. He said that the granting of an auto repair/body shop could allow for much more on the site. Variances run with the land.

Doug Hayes of 128 Route 129 spoke in favor of the application. He knows that Joe Osborne had enlarged the area around the garage to allow the movement of trucks and trailers and worked on landscaping.

Joe Jackson of 35 Plateau Ridge Road spoke in support of the application. He said that Joe Osborne was a great neighbor and kept his property well maintained.

Sid Porter of 24 Plateau Ridge Road said he cringes with the thought of a body shop business. He feared that it was going to be slipped in with the approval. In January, there were over 20 big rigs on the property. It is noisy. He was against a body shop with odors, fumes, and toxins.

Chairman Earl Tuson said they received a letter from abutter Linda Porter of 24 Plateau Ridge Road speaking against the application. They received other letters, but they were not from abutters. Chairman Earl Tuson read RSA 676.7 1 A – "The board shall hear all abutters and holders of conservation, preservation, or agricultural preservation restrictions desiring to submit testimony and all non-abutters who can demonstrate that they are affected directly by the proposal under consideration. The board may hear such other persons as it deems appropriate."

Rodney Phillips of 143 Clough Hill Road called for a point of order from the Chairman. In the Rules of Procedure for the ZBA, it says "those appearing in favor of the appeal shall be allowed to speak" and "those in opposition to the appeal shall be allowed to speak". Chairman Earl Tuson stated that it does not clarify or specify as to whom "those" is referring to. The Board allowed

the public to speak at the December meeting at the Board's discretion and they were not bound by their previous decision.

Tracy Koufos of 65 Plateau Ridge Road requested to speak. She

was not a direct abutter of the applicant but said she was affected as a taxpayer and passes by the property daily. Plateau Ridge Road abuts the property in question, and she is concerned about the town ordinances being followed. Chairman Earl Tuson said that there was established case law to RSA 676.7 that being a town resident does not bring someone to the level of being directly affected. He said it was on the burden of Tracy Koufos to prove why she is directly affected. The points she made do not establish that she is directly affected. She replied that she has concerns about her property values. Peter Pitman made a motion that Tracy Koufos was not directly affected by the application. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. Alvin See chose to abstain. The Board voted with 3 yes and 1 no that she was not directly affected. Chairman Earl Tuson explained that the Board can choose to hear testimony from her. She has been very involved in the process and they did let her speak in the past. Peter Pitman said that when the Board agreed to rehear the application, they started over from scratch and what was previously allowed does not need to stick this time around. Chairman Earl Tuson said that the Board has been very inclusive with allowing others to testify and he was in favor of allowing her to testify.

Tracy Koufos spoke against the application. She said that granting the variance would be contrary to the public interest and it would go against the spirit of the ordinance. The business is operating as more than the approved MHO and there is no site plan.

Doug Hayes of 128 Route 129 said that their property values have increased according to a letter received from their mortgage company.

Steven Zawiska of 518 Old Shaker Road said that he tries to stay local with his purchases and uses Osborne's. It is an asset to have the business in Town.

Paul Johnson of 109 Flagg Road spoke in favor of the application.

Rodney Phillips of 143 Clough Hill Road spoke in opposition of the application. He said that the spirit of the ordinance is not observed because the criterion of a MHO specifically excludes automotive uses. Substantial justice is not done because there is no "gain" to the general public' conveniences does not equate to gain. Literal enforcement of the ordinance does not establish unnecessary hardship because the special conditions of the property do not include its closeness to other zones. The hardship is not related to the characteristics of the property. If this variance is granted, it changes the use of the property to commercial which ceases the residential use.

Jacob Farwell, as a family representative to his relatives at 603 Route 129, spoke in favor of the business.

Meredith Goldstein said that the property was being used as mixed use which is why they were coming for the variance. It was a permissible use with other businesses in Town. Without an adjustment, the delays will shut him down. She presented a letter from Realtor Biana Contreras which stated there was no impact to property values. In terms of the concerns with DES, the agency was on site about a month ago and had no concerns with toxins. Joe Osborne said that he burns his waste oil, which is all stored in double-walled certified containers, and he stores under the amount that is allowable.

Chairman Earl Tuson asked a question in relation to an auto body document that was submitted by abutter Linda Porter about the storage of coatings. He asked Joe Osborne if he was using more than 500 gallons of coatings in a year on the vehicles he was working on. Joe Osborne answered that he was not doing coatings. Meredith Goldstein expressed their interest and intention for the business to stay purely mechanical in nature. Alvin See asked if they were using any type of paint in their work. Chairman Earl Tuson said that any paint being used was incidental to the work being done on vehicles.

Chairman Earl Tuson asked the Board that with all the changes that had been done to the site if they had any interest in going out and viewing the site. Charlie Aznive and Peter Pitman answered that they had no interest. Ned Lizotte answered that he would like to see it. Alvin See and Chairman Earl Tuson were on the edge with their decision. Alvin See said that he would like to review what is considered to be parking on the site and what was turnaround area. Ned Lizotte said that it would help with the understanding of steep slopes on the site. Chairman Earl Tuson said that seeing the site would help with applying conditions to the approval if necessary.

Ned Lizotte made a motion to continue application #Z23-36 to a site walk. The motion was seconded by Alvin See. By a vote of 3 yes and 2 no, the motion carried. A site walk of the property was scheduled for February 26, 2024, at 4:30 PM. No further notice will be given.

The Board took a 5 minute recess from 8:23 PM to 8:28 PM.

New Business -

Application #Z24-04 Muzzey Map 31 Lot 03 – Special Exception to allow for a reduced front setback

Application #Z24-05 Muzzey Map 31 Lot 03 – Special Exception to allow for an ADU

Applicant Steven Muzzey of 143 Piper Hill Road was present.

Alvin See made a motion that application #Z24-04 did not constitute a Development of Regional Impact. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. All in favor, the motion carried.

Alvin See made a motion that application #Z24-05 did not constitute a Development of Regional Impact. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. All in favor, the motion carried.

Steven Muzzey explained that they wanted to add an addition to their existing house with a garage and an ADU. They had initially asked for a reduction in the front setback from 50' to 40' on their application, but after receiving finalized plans from their surveyor, they needed to ask to reduce the setback from 50' to 25'. Steven Muzzey updated the application to reflect the change. They wanted to add a 3 car garage with an ADU. The ADU would be maxed out at 1000' and

would have a walk out basement.

The Board reviewed the points of application #Z24-04. A Special Exception was requested from Article II Section 204.5 to reduce the front setback from 50' to 25'. A reduction in the front setback allows the new structure to stay on the front side of the property away from the steeper grades further back. There would be no further impacts in the reduction of the front setback. It appears that properties within the neighborhood and surrounding properties have similar front setbacks.

Ned Lizotte said he was very familiar with the property and understood the steep slopes on the rear of the property.

The Board reviewed the points of application #Z24-05. A Special Exception was requested from Article V Section 509 to allow for an ADU on the property. The plans for the ADU include a 1500 gallon septic disposal system, mini splits will be used for hearing and cooling, and the ADU would be maxed out at 1000'. There would be adequate parking on site.

Chairman Earl Tuson closed the public hearing and opened Board deliberations. Peter Pitman made a motion to approve Application #Z24-04 as amended by the applicant. Chairman Earl Tuson stated they needed to complete the findings of fact first. Peter Pitman withdrew the motion.

The Board discussed the findings of fact for Application #Z24-04. They found that:

- 1. The rear of the property is steep.
- 2. Neighboring parcels have comparable setbacks.

Peter Pitman made a motion to approve Application #Z24-04 as amended by the applicant. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. Roll call vote: Ned Lizotte – yes, Peter Pitman – yes, Chairman Earl Tuson – yes, Charlie Aznive – yes, Alvin See – yes. Application #Z24-04 was approved.

Ned Lizotte made a motion to approve application #Z24-05 as amended by the applicant. The motion was seconded by Peter Pitman. Roll call vote: Alvin See – yes, Charlie Aznive – yes, Chairman Earl Tuson – yes, Peter Pitman – yes, Ned Lizotte – yes. Application #Z24-05 was approved.

Application #Z24-06 Hague Map 53 Lot 7-1 – Variance to allow a duplex in AFP

The applicant was not present.

Abutter Michael Harris of 485 Lower Ridge Road was present.

Peter Pitman made a motion to continue Application #Z24-06 to the March 2024 meeting. Michael Harris stated that he was a disabled and elderly man, and it was difficult for him to show up. Chairman Earl Tuson said that the Board feels they need to continue the application to the March meeting. The Rules of Procedures require the applicant to testify. The motion was seconded by Alvin See. All in favor, the motion carried. There will be no further notice.
