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

#### N'dakinna Trail Opening

The Loudon Conservation Commission and its Trails Subcommittee are pleased to announce the October 11th opening of a new hiking trail in a town forest. N'dakinna (pronounced IN-DAH-kee-NAH) is the Abenaki Indian word for "Our Homeland." The trail parking lot is on Rte. 129, about ½ mile east of the Clough Hill Road intersection. The small parking lot can accommodate four vehicles. The one mile long trail is not too strenuous, and offers several scenic views.

The property was identified by the Commission in 2001 for possible trail development. In 2020, a survey of Loudon residents by the town indicated that a majority of those who responded wanted more hiking trails in town. Volunteers for the Conservation Commission's Trails Subcommittee began development in 2021.

Trash cleanup was a significant portion of this project. Several tons of building debris, furniture, automotive parts, tires, glass, and metal were collected by hand; sorted and recycled when possible.

Volunteers for the Conservation Commission donated over 500 hours to the development of this trail. Approximately two-thirds of the development costs were donated by area businesses and individuals. Of the remaining one-third of costs, most were paid with federal American Recovery Plan (Covid-19) funds. Only a few hundred dollars came from the Conservation Commission budget.

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# Loudon Food Pantry

How we helped our communities

In July 2023 we gave out enough food to 230 individuals for them to prepare 3,967 meals. Of these people, 137 were age 60 and older (60%), 33 were age 18 or under (14%), and 60 were between those ages (26%).

In August 2023 we gave out enough food to 246 individuals for them to prepare 4,820 meals. Of these people, 136 were age 60 and older (52%), 42 were age 18 or under (22%), and 68 were between those ages (28%).

Help Support the Community and the Environment

Loudon Old Home Day

The Loudon Foo0d Pantry had a booth at Loudon Old Home Day this year. It was great reconnecting with everyone and signing up new people as well. This year turned out to be exceptional. We collected \$3,280.90 in donations and sold \$2 in wrist bands.

In addition to the sales and donations, we unexpectedly received the following: The Lions Pancake breakfast held on Saturday donated



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\$1,400 and The Joint Church Service held on Sunday donated \$687

The total received from Loudon Old Home Day events was \$5,369.90. These additional funds will allow us to purchase engough and hand out enough food to create 21,480 meals. It was completely unexpected. Thank you so much!

# Loudon Lions Club






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# Loudon Historical Society

A Glimpse into the Historical Society

An iron collection? Probably a lot of people don't even own one iron anymore. Or maybe you have an antique one that looks nice as a doorstop. The Historical Society is now proudly displaying Brad Stuarts's donation of 10 antique flatirons.

Wrinkled clothes were once rubbed with smooth stones, flat hard wood or rolled with a wooden roller. Flatirons heated with fire were first used in China but became popular in Europe in the 17th century. The flatiron was set on a stove or on a stand in the fireplace. Once hot, the iron had to be held with a pad or thick towel to iron the clothes laid out on a table. The iron lost heat quickly so many households owned two so that one was hot at all times. It was a practiced art to use the iron at just the right temperature so the clothes would not be scorched. Attention and care was also needed to keep the iron clean and free of soot. The electric iron was patented by Henry W. Seely on June 6, 1882. However, electric irons did not gain popularity until the mid-1920's when houses started to be wired for electricity. The first steam iron appeared in 1938.

Some of the highlights of our collection are the Baby Betsy Ross Electric Iron which is powered by screwing it into a light socket. It is a child's toy made by the Central Flatiron Manufacturing Company. We have a sad iron made by Howell Wright Company 1800 and early 1900. Sad is an Old English term for solid and this iron is certainly solid being very small and weighing 5.5 pounds. The Coleman Insta-Lite gas iron is most interesting. Coleman irons were made in beautiful colors and ours is Cool Blue. Coleman made the gas irons between 1929 and 1948. These irons were especially appreciated



in the summer since they made the chore of ironing much less hot. Today with clothes dryers and wrinkle resistant fabrics, ironing is certainly easier if it is needed at all.

We invite you to stop in at the Museum to see some of our newest acquisitions. We now own the painting used for the front cover of the Loudon history book and it is worth the trip to see that in person. The Museum is open on the first and third Wednesday of each month from 1-3 pm. 



Please see the information below regarding HB2. This will be effective as of Friday, September 1st, 2023.

HB2 FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQ's)

Q: Why am I being charged a new fee?

A: On July 1st, 2023 House Bill two (2) became effective, requiring municipal agents to collect the new surcharge

Q: What is HB2?

A: HB2 is a house bill that was passed by the legislature and signed by the Governor on June 6th, 2023, effective July 1st, 2023

Q: Does HB2 Impact me?

A: Do you have a Battery Electric or Plug-in Hybrid Vehicle?

- If they answer Yes When you register your vehicle at your city or town hall, the fees will be included. There is a separate line that lists the additional fees
- If they answer No There is no impact to you

Q: What if I buy a battery electric or plug-in hybrid vehicle outside of my birth month?

A: As with every other plate type, fees are prorated by month

Q: What if I have a battery electric or plug-in hybrid vehicle and I trade it in for a gas or diesel model?

A: You will receive a prorated credit towards the new vehicle at the time of registration

Q: When will I be required to pay the new fees?

A: At time of registration for:

- New Battery Electric or Plug-in Hybrid Vehicles
- Registration renewal for Battery Electric or Plug-in Hybrid Vehicles
- iii. Registration Transfers to Battery Electric or Plug-in Hybrid Vehicles

Q: Is there anyone with a Battery Electric or Plug-in Hybrid Vehicle not required to pay?

Any person or agency not required to pay gas tax, by law





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

July 20, 2023, Zoning Amendment Workshop #1 Minutes -

Rodney Phillips suggested an edit to line 17 to change "Pearl" to "Phillips".

Rodney Phillips made a motion to accept the Zoning Amendment Workshop #1 minutes with the one correction. The motion was seconded by Josh Pearl. Vote: 6 in favor, Vice Chair Danielle Bosco abstained. The motion carried. The Zoning Amendment Workshop #1 minutes were accepted.

July 20, 2023, Regular Meeting Minutes -

Rodney Phillips suggested an edit to line 70-71 to add "that if a light could be tipped it could not be full cutoff and would not comply with the Ordinance."

Rodney Phillips suggested an edit to line 95 to change "now" to "not".

Josh Pearl made a motion to accept the Regular Meeting Minutes with 2 corrections. The motion was seconded by Vice Chair Danielle Bosco. All in favor, the motion carried. The Regular Meeting Minutes from the July 20, 2023, Planning Board Public Hearing were accepted.

#### Discussion:

Jon Rokeh came before the Board to discuss property owned by Central NH Trailers, specifically two parcels located at Map 60 Lot 27 and Map 60 Lot 66. The applicant has an open application with the ZBA scheduled for the 8/24/23 meeting for wetland buffer impacts.

The applicant wants to utilize the two lots during construction on the other new lot for storage. They want to put a fence along the front with gates at the entrance. The lots were graded and have gravel on them. Jon Rokeh was asking the Board what was necessary for an application moving forward. Rodney Phillips asked if it was going to be for temporary storage, and Jon Rokeh said it would be for long-term storage. Chairman Jeff Green said that previous staging at the site was for temporary road construction, but it looked like a site plan would be needed now. Rodney Phillips asked if there were any improvements to the site other than a fence and gates and Jon Rokeh answered that there would not be any. Rodney Phillips said the lot would need a site plan but not much else would be needed as not much was changing. Chairman Jeff Green said he would want to make sure the state driveway permits were in place as well.

Josh Pearl said that his concern would be with RV storage and fluids from the vehicles and any type of impacts that would have. Forrest Green responded that a site plan would help to determine the impacts on any type of wetlands. Rodney Phillips said he would want the site to look good and storage of the vehicles would need to be behind the parking lot setback with some type of landscaping to dress up the front. Jon Rokeh said that the lot would be used primarily for storage. Rodney Phillips questioned whether it would be the storage of products or the display of products. Forrest Green that the Board could require landscaping with a site plan. Rodney Phillips agreed that only the minimal would be required. Jon Rokeh confirmed that his applicant wanted to make sure to submit the right application. Rodney Phillips said a major site plan would be required. Chairman Jeff Green said the applicant was always welcome to ask for waivers for things not relevant to the site plan.

**Board Discussion & Correspondence** 

Letter from Bob Phillips

The Board received an email from Bob Phillips resigning as an Alternate member of the Planning Board. Alternate Bill Taranovich said he thought Bob Phillips had contributed greatly to the Board and Josh Pearl agreed.

Core & Main

The applicant had built the retention plan in a place different from where it was agreed upon. Tim Bernier from TF Bernier came before the Board to discuss the submission of as-built plans for Core & Main. He explained how the contractor was given the concept plan rather than the approved site plan and completed the site according to the wrong plan. They had to resurvey the plot and rerun all the drainage calculations. There was still landscaping to be done but he wanted to get the plan signed off before doing any more work.

Rodney Phillips explained that he was fine with the as built and the stormwater analysis, but it was just not how the plan was approved. Chairman Jeff Green said that the plan had not been signed yet.

Josh Pearl made a motion to accept the as-built site and grading plans for Core & Main. The motion was seconded by Vice Chair Danielle Bosco. Roll call vote: Ex-Officio John Storrs – yes, Vice Chair Danielle Bosco – yes, Chairman Jeff Green – yes, Rodney Phillips – yes, Josh Pearl – yes, Marilyn Whitten – yes, Forrest Green – yes. All in favor, the motion carried.

Taranovich Subdivision

Alternate Bill Taranovich recused himself.

Last month, the Board discussed the possibility of having a bond or a promissory letter signed by the applicant for the road repairs. The Town Attorney was contacted to discuss what route to take. The Road Agent said they were starting road work within 1 to 1 ½ weeks. The Town Attorney had suggested a bond for the work. The Chairman read the previous month's decision of the Board to grant a 90 day extension pending the recommendation from the Town Attorney for either the bond or promissory letter. Chairman Jeff Green discussed that a bond takes time and would require review from the applicant's engineer, the town's engineer, and the Selectmen.

Matt Routhier from TF Moran discussed the applicant's actions. He said they had wanted to work with Pike for the road repairs, but Pike had pulled away. He had a discussion with the Road Agent about doing the base layer with the top layer in the spring. He said that Pike could do the structures but not the major work. The applicant was actively trying to secure a contractor. Pike could not do the whole job as they did not have enough manpower.

Chairman Jeff Green said that the Road Agent was planning on doing the work in the first 2 weeks of September. The Board discussed the timeline for doing the road work, the culverts, and the retention pond.

Chairman Jeff Green said the biggest concern at the point was the

funding of the work. Matt Routhier said that a promissory letter of commitment may be quicker and more feasible than a bond. The applicant and the Board discussed the feasibility of an escrow, but it was decided against this route. Chairman Jeff Green said that if an estimate could be created it would help.

He said they had submitted for state subdivision approval. Rodney Phillips suggested working with the Town Administrator regarding a letter. Matt Routhier said they could put together an estimate and work with the Road Agent and the Town Administrator. Chairman Jeff Green confirmed that the extension of 90 days was in place at this point pending the letter. The vesting period was confirmed to be 1 year. Matt Routhier said they would hear back regarding the state subdivision approval within a few weeks, and they would not need an extension longer than that point. The Board agreed this was the best course of action.

Alternate Bill Taranovich rejoined the Board.

Meeting with Town Attorney

Chairman Jeff Green reminded the Board members there was a meeting scheduled with the Town Attorney on September 14 at 9:00 AM in the large meeting room at the Town Office. This would be a closed meeting between the Board members and the Town Attorney.

#### Osborne

Chairman Jeff Green referenced an email from Town Attorney regarding the Major Home Occupation at Osborne's property. He said it sounds like the Board's hands are tied at this time. Rodney Phillips referenced a previous email from Town Attorney from March 2023. He said the Planning Board was not an enforcement board, but the previous email made it seem like the Board does have jurisdiction in the matter. Josh Pearl said that because the applicant did not get a site plan, the Board does not have authority; the Board has authority to revoke or review the approval when there is a site plan. Because there is no site plan, it is an issue for the Selectmen to enforce. Rodney Phillips asked why the Selectmen were not doing anything in that case. Josh

Pearl asked Ex-Officio John Storrs where the Selectmen stood on the issue. He answered that there was nothing the Selectmen could do. Josh Pearl said there it was not a Planning Board issue because there was no site plan, it was a Selectmen issue. Ex-Officio John Storrs replied that the meeting with the Town Attorney was a response to the questions from the situation.

The Board discussed the process by which applications are heard before both the Planning and Zoning Boards. Chairman Jeff Green said that the Zoning Board was an appeals Board. If someone had an issue with what the Planning Board or Building Inspector said, they could then go to the Zoning Board. He said that other towns start at the Planning Board and then go to Zoning. Chairman Jeff Green said that the Major Home Occupation gives them permission to have the business, but a site plan allows them to have the business on the property. He suggested reviewing the application process. Rodney Phillips agreed that might be what was missing with the process. Vice Chair Danielle Bosco said that reviewing the process and the order for the applications may help to slow things down. Forrest Green said that Code Enforcement had sent the applicant to Zoning, but they should have been sent to Planning for a site plan first. Josh Pearl agreed that the application should come before Planning for a

review or consultation before proceeding any further. Rodney Phillips agreed that the process needed to be cleaned up. Rodney Phillips said that the Zoning Ordinance has language for Code Enforcement to enforce.

From the audience, Tracy Koufos of 65 Plateau Ridge said that she has read the ordinance and it seems as if Osborne is not following the guidelines. Rodney Phillips stated that they were not just guidelines, but they were an ordinance to be followed. Josh Pearl agreed that they do apply, and it is an enforcement issue. Rodney Phillips said that Tracy Koufos was interpreting things correctly because the ordinance says "shall".

BFA - Nobis

Nobis Engineering received and reviewed the revised documentation for the BFA Charter School and accepted all changes. The plans can get signed by the Chairman now.

#### Regulations

Chairman Jeff Green shared a list of regulation changes he would like to propose:

- 1. Mylars for subdivisions, 2 Mylars are required, and for site plans, 1 Mylar is required. He stated that Mylars were not relevant anymore, they were expensive to produce, and they cannot be copied. Rodney Phillips said that applicants are now submitting electronic plans. Chairman Jeff Green said he would like final submissions to include no Mylars, 3 large copies of the plans, and a digital file. A public hearing would be required to make any changes.
- 2. Location Scale Chairman Jeff Green said that the Board was getting many waivers requested for the scale of 1" = 1000' for the locus map. It makes it difficult to get a clear picture of the location for some applications. Rodney Phillips agreed. Chairman Jeff Green said that the scale would need to be appropriate for the application.
- 3. Sheet Size The sheet size scale was currently 1" = 50'. Chairman Jeff Green said this was just something to think about. Rodney Phillips said that he wanted to make sure the

Board could see everything. Chairman Jeff Green said he would be okay with waivers appropriate to each application.

- 4. Eliminate TRC Process Chairman Jeff Green said he would like to eliminate the TRC process. He understands that it is not feasible to eliminate it entirely, but he wanted to improve the process. He said that TRC wouldn't be necessary for minor site plans or boundary line adjustments. It was a lot of time and money for plans for small applications.
- 5. Submission Amounts Currently, plan sets must include 6 full sized plans and 12 reduced sized plans. Chairman Jeff Green discussed the importance of still having copies for TRC but not as many. The Department Heads prefer having digital copies sent to them prior to TRC and having a full-sized plan available for review.

Rodney Phillips mentioned that he was still fine with having the submission deadline changed from 15 days to 10 days between TRC and the Planning Board meeting.

NHMS Sound Study

Rodney Phillips asked if the Chairman had followed up with the sound study for the NHMS Flat Track. Chairman Jeff Green said he had not but will.

Johnson Site Plan Status

Rodney Phillips asked Vice Chair Danielle Bosco for an update on the John C. Johnson site plan status. She responded that the applicant will likely need to request more time.

Millican & Whoville Letters

Rodney Phillips asked if the Chairman had written letters for Millican Nurseries and Whoville since the last meeting. Chairman Jeff Green said he had not but he was waiting for an answer from Town Attorney about the Board's jurisdiction for site plan reviews. Rodney Phillips asked if the Chairman could bring it up to the Town Attorney for advice to move forward. For clarification, Millican Nurseries is an agricultural property being used as a commercial entity. Whoville has increased their parking by 25% or more which triggers site plan review. Rodney Phillips clarified that Millican was not the typical small agricultural business and Josh Pearl said that Millican put a building on the property. Alternate Alicha Kingsbury said it was commercial agriculture. Rodney Phillips said they needed to be sensitive to the impact for the neighborhood.

Loudon Sand & Gravel on Lower Ridge Road

Rodney Phillips said that he was reading over the agreed upon plan for the lot on Lower Ridge Road and it said that the plan was for concrete by the end of September and for sand removal by the end of the year. However, they do not have approval to remove sand and would need an excavation permit.

Adjournment:

Ex-Officio John Storrs made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 8:30 PM. The motion was seconded by Forrest Green. All in favor, the motion carried.

Acceptance of Minutes:

Alvin See suggested an edit to line 61 to change "1.4" story to "1.5" story.

Peter Pitman made a motion to accept the July 2023 Regular Meeting Minutes as amended. The motion was seconded by Alvin See. All in favor, the motion carried; the minutes were approved as amended.

August 8, 2023, Site Walk Minutes, DuFour

Peter Pitman made a motion to accept the August 8, 2023, Site Walk Minutes as written. The motion was seconded by Alvin See. All in favor, the motion carried; the minutes were approved.

August 8, 2023, Site Walk Minutes, Bartlett

Peter Pitman made a motion to accept the August 8, 2023, Site Walk Minutes as written. The motion was seconded by Alvin See. All in favor, the motion carried; the minutes were approved.

The Zoning Board hears appeals for rehearings, special exceptions, variances, and administrative appeals. They need to be filed within a timely basis within 45 days of an action. For further information, applicants can see the Loudon Zoning Ordinance, the RSAs, or can stop by the Zoning Office and talk to Lindsey during business hours.

**Public Hearings:** 

Old Business -

Application #Z23-01 Cobblestone Properties of Epsom – Map 49 Lot 123 – Special Exception to Allow for Automotive Repair

The applicant was present. Kurt and Lorraine Wageling, abutters at 7077 Shaker Road, were present. John Laboe, counsel for the Wagelings, was present. John Thompson, 70 Shaker Road, was present (not a direct abutter).

Corey Giroux, counsel for Cobblestone Properties of Epsom, was present. Since the site visit, the applicant and the owner of the property has taken the comments seriously and has made some improvements to the property. An acoustical expert was brought in to do modeling about how the sound traveled around the property as a result of the dyno. It was determined that a solid state

deflection wall could be installed opposite of the dyno to deflect some of the noise. Since installation, it has had a significant effect on reducing the sound to the neighboring properties. The applicant installed a solid fence to the maximum allowable height to mitigate other sounds from the business. These were installed in early July 2023. Most of the issues have been mitigated completely. At this stage, the parties involved (the applicant and the Wagelings) have entered into an agreement moving forward regarding conditions for use. There is some support from the Wagelings at this point for the application itself. An agreement has been reached. The application satisfies the criteria for a Special Exception. Chairman Earl Tuson asked if the conditions that were agreed upon would be available for the Board to review, and Attorney Giroux said the conditions were attached to the use not necessarily the parcel.

Attorney John Laboe presented to the Board. He said they have no objections to the application and support it given that the conditions are followed. The normal operations were comfortably below anything that would bother the abutter. Occasionally, there would

be a situation that would exceed the comfort level of the abutter, but they have defined limitations and conditions for these situations. (Vice Chair Todd Phelps left the room at 7:10 PM to make copies of the conditions submitted by the Wagelings and Attorney Laboe.) They have no objections if the Board accepts the conditions.

Chairman Earl Tuson invited John Thompson of 7091 Shaker Road to address the Board. He said that he doesn't necessarily agree that it has been normal operations as the sound carries to his house. He asked a question regarding property values being diminished because of the applicant and was told by Chairman Earl Tuson that Special Exception applications don't hold weight with diminished property values, variances do. Chairman Earl Tuson explained that Special Exceptions run with the land and don't go away. John Thompson said he thinks it would be a huge concern for the neighborhood if the dyno is approved. Chairman Earl Tuson said that the Board was not limited to the conditions set by the Wagelings and the applicant. (Vice Chair Todd Phelps returned at 7:14 PM.)

Attorney Giroux reaffirmed that the conditions were reasonable, and the abutters agreed that the conditions satisfied their concerns. Charlie Aznive said he was very pleased with the agreement the parties came up with. Alvin See asked if the hours of operation listed were intended to be for every day. Attorney Giroux answered that it was not intended to restrict any days. He said the business does not currently operate on Sundays and the intention was for the hours listed to be for any day the business was in operation. Alvin See asked if there was any limitation on how many times the 30-60 interval could be done in a day or an afternoon. Attorney Giroux answered that it was intended to be no more than once per month. Alvin See said that #4C specified the Wagelings specifically. He asked if it includes any future residents of the property. Attorney Giroux said that the condition runs with the use, and whomever occupies the property will have the benefit of the provision. Chairman Earl Tuson asked where the agreement specified that it would be binding on any future heirs or assigns. Attorney Giroux answered that it doesn't, but any conditions of approval set by the Board will continue to run with the property. Alvin See asked if the Board could make the application apply to the neighbors rather than just the applicant. Chairman Earl Tuson said that the use that the Wagelings have is different than many of the abutting parcels of land. The Wagelings are in RR and many of the abutting parcels are C/I. Alvin See said that this application approval would be just for Cobblestone Properties of Epsom for the Map and Lot. He said the approval wouldn't be binding on other neighbors. Peter Pitman said he understood what Alvin See was saying and that he agreed. He said that they can't

make the agreement binding on them because they are not the party that is looking for relief. Cobblestone is looking for relief to run their business, but they are not bound to this agreement. Attorney Giroux agreed with this; the Wageling's relief in this situation was that there was an agreement between them and the applicant that was binding regardless of the blessing of the Board. Chairman Earl Tuson said there was no burden on the Wagelings. Peter Pitman said they could take some of the things from the agreement and add it to the conditions of approval. Chairman Earl Tuson said the agreement was binding to the parties involved but was not binding to the Board. Vice Chair Todd Phelps said they could include some of the conditions but did not have to include all of them. They could adopt conditions 1-6 as presented but did not have to adopt all.

Attorney Laboe said that the conditions did not put a burden on the Wagelings, but the benefit of the conditions was to whomever owned

the property after them. The benefits of the conditions run with the land. He also wanted to clarify that the limitations and restrictions that benefit the Wagelings run with the approved use, they do not attach to the land indefinitely. It was an approval for the tenant. Charlie Aznive said he believed that the Board also understood it this way.

Chairman Earl Tuson said the Board received a letter in June from Robert Fiske.

Attorney Giroux wanted to point out that in the proposed conditions, it was a component of the terms of their lease as well.

Chairman Earl Tuson closed the public hearing and opened Board deliberations.

Peter Pitman said that if they approve this, they need to make days of the week of use a condition. He suggested Monday through Friday. Charlie Aznive said he would add Saturday. Chairman Earl Tuson said that he would make it a hybrid. He said another automotive repair may be reasonable at different times. Peter Pitman said he recommended making it a condition that the dyno could not run on Saturday. The Board members discussed conditions for running the dyno and doing automotive work in the shop.

Chairman Earl Tuson asked the Board if they wanted to place any restrictions on automotive use. The Board did not.

The Board discussed creating conditions of approval for the application. They discussed notification for Code Enforcement for using the dyno.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps made a motion to accept Application #Z23-01 as presented with the following conditions:

- 1. Dyno cell operations onsite will be conducted only between the hours of 9am and 5pm, Monday through Saturday.
- 2. Existing sound deflection and mitigation to include the sound deflection wall and sound mitigating fence along the property line of Map 58 Lot 124 must be well maintained.
- 3. Normal operation of the dyno cell will not exceed 77db as measured at the corner pin at Map 58 Lot 124 closest to the business.
- 4. If the dyno cell operations are to exceed the sounds levels as set forth in condition #3, the business owner needs to notify the Loudon Code Enforcement office and the direct abutter at Map 58 Lot 124 of the occurrence at minimum of two days in advance.
- 5. The Dyno cell will not exceed 77db more regularly than one day monthly and never exceed 90db as measured in the manner set forth in condition #3.

The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. Roll call vote: Vice Chair Todd Phelps – yes, Peter Pitman – yes, Chairman Earl Tuson – yes, Charlie Aznive – yes, Alvin See – yes. All in favor, Application #Z23-01 was approved.

Chairman Earl Tuson stated that the appeal period for this application was 45 days.

Applications #Z23-19 for a Reduced Setback, #Z23-20 for a Variance, and #Z23-21 for a variance on Clough Pond Road were all submitted

by the same applicant, Brewster Bartlett. The applications focused on the properties located at 300 and 304 Clough Pond Road, Map 58 Lot 74 and Map 58 Lot 76. The applicant and surveyor Mark Sargent were present. There were no abutters present.

Application #Z23-19 was discussed. A Special Exception was requested to allow for a reduced setback from Article II Section 204.5. The application proposes to remove a manufactured home from the site and replace it with a stick built residential structure. The proposed structure will encroach less on the front and side lot lines than the existing manufactured home. The existing home on the site has a functioning septic system and on-site water supply. The applicant would like to maintain the existing septic system and a minimum of 15' of separation between the system and the new home is required causing the building to be set closer to the road. There will be no additional demand on municipal services. There will be minimal impacts on road capacity and conditions. The special exception will permit the removal of a sub-standard structure. The site has an existing septic and well which will be utilized. There will be no adverse impact on the natural environment. There will be no additional impact on groundwater resources. The encroachment on the setback will be less than what is currently existing and will not have adverse impacts. There will be ample room to widen the road in the future.

Chairman Earl Tuson closed the public hearing and opened Board discussion.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps made a motion to accept Application #Z23-19 as presented. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. Roll call vote: Alvin See – yes, Charlie Aznive – yes, Chairman Earl Tuson – yes, Peter Pitman – yes, Vice Chair Todd Phelps – yes. All in favor. Application #Z23-19 was approved.

Application #Z23-20 was discussed. The applicant is proposing a lot line adjustment. The lot on the west side is a T-shape and the lot on the east is smaller. There is no way to get the required contiguous buildable area. It will clear up the boundary line on the back line.

The applicant requested a variance from Article II Section 204.4D to permit a lot line adjustment that will make a non-conforming lot more non-conforming. The applicant asks that the terms of the Zoning Ordinance be waived to permit contiguous buildable area be less than the required minimum of 1.5 acres to a lot area of 1.03 acres. (This was amended during the meeting.)

The variance will not be contrary to public interest because the proposed lot line adjustment will still provide the donating parcel with area that is currently improved. The spirit of the ordinance is observed because the portion of the parcel to be annexed to the abutting parcel is not utilized by the donating parcel. Substantial justice is done because the allowance of the variance will increase the side of the abutting non-conforming parcel, making both parcels almost equal in size. The variance will not have an adverse impact on surrounding properties. Lot 74 has a unique "T" configuration with a portion of the parcel being located behind lot 76. Annexation of that portion behind lot 76 will reconfigure the parcel so it is more conforming with the other

parcels in the area. This neighborhood is more densely populated with smaller lots and the lot line adjustment will still provide enough area to support a home, well, and septic system. The lot line adjustment will add land to lot 76 which is located directly behind the parcel,

thereby creating a more conforming parcel.

Chairman Earl Tuson closed the public hearing and opened Board deliberations.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps said that it seems to make sense the way the lots are set up. It provides value to lot 76.

The Board went through the 5 points of the application. All 5 points passed unanimously.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps made a motion to accept Application #Z23-20 as amended by the applicant because it passed all 5 tests for a variance. The motion was seconded by Peter Pitman. Roll call vote: Vice Chair Todd Phelps – yes, Peter Pitman – yes, Chairman Earl Tuson – yes, Charlie Aznive – yes, Alvin See – yes. All in favor, Application #Z23-20 was approved.

Application #Z23-21 was discussed. The application requested a variance from Article II Section 204.4A. The applicant amended the application to read that a variance be allowed to permit a lot size area of 1.03 acres, which is less than what Zoning requires.

The variance will not be contrary to public interest because the approval of the lot line adjustment will reconfigure an existing nonconforming lot so that an area directly behind said lot will be annexed to it and increase the lot size by 0.48 acres, almost doubling the size of the parcel. The spirit of the ordinance is observed because the reconfigured lot line will not impact the accommodation of a house, well, and septic on the lot. Substantial justice is done because the variance will increase the size of the abutting non-conforming parcel, making both parcels almost equal in size while not impacting the functionality of lot 74. The variance will not have an adverse impact on surrounding properties. Lot 74 has a unique "T" configuration with a portion of the parcel being located behind lot 76. The annexation of that portion behind lot 76 will reconfigure the parcel so that it is more conforming with other parcels in the area. The lot line adjustment will add land to lot 76 which is located directly behind the parcel, thereby creating a more conforming parcel.

Chairman Earl Tuson closed the public hearing and opened Board deliberations.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps made a motion to accept Application #Z23-21 as amended by the applicant because it passed all 5 tests for a variance. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. Roll call vote: Alvin See – yes, Charlie Aznive – yes, Chairman Earl Tuson – yes, Peter Pitman – yes, Vice Chair Todd Phelps – yes. All in favor, Application #Z23-21 was approved.

Application #Z23-22 DuFour – Map 20 Lot 6 – Special Exception to Allow for a Reduced Setback

The applicant, Bob DuFour, was present. Abutters Ed and Jean Dumais of 152 South Village Road were present.

Alvin See made a motion that Application #Z23-22 did not constitute a Development of Regional Impact. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. All in favor, the motion carried; Application #Z23-22 was not a Development of Regional Impact.

Charlie Aznive said that there was a question at the site walk about the setback. It was measured to be 7'10". The applicant amended the application to request a reduced setback to 7'.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps asked what year the deck was put on. Bob DuFour said about 9 years ago, 2014. He asked when the shed was added. Bob DuFour answered 5 or 6 years ago. Vice Chair Todd Phelps asked if the applicant knew the dimensions of the driveway. The applicant did not. Chairman Earl Tuson explained maximum building coverage on the lot and why it was important. He explained the stipulation of the Board giving the applicant the reduced setback and the impact on building coverage. The Board worked with the applicant to determine his coverage on the lot and the percentage of what was allowed.

The Board reviewed the points of the application. A Special Exception was requested from Article II Section 203.5 to allow for a 7' reduced setback for a garage. There will be no injurious or detrimental effects on the neighborhood. There are no special conditions required. There will be no additional demand on municipal services. There will be no increased traffic volume, no impact on the natural environment, and no impact on groundwater resources. There will be no adverse impacts because of the granting of the special exception.

The abutter agreed with the applicant's proposed action.

Chairman Earl Tuson closed the public hearing and opened Board deliberations. Charlie Aznive agreed that the plan seemed to keep with the neighborhood as seen on the site walk. Vice Chair Todd Phelps said that his concern was that a Special Exception for a reduced side setback had been approved on this lot a few years ago on the other side because the applicant had not wanted anything on this current proposed side. He has some issues with having to reduce the side setback on one side when it could have been on the other side the whole time. He was also concerned that the application stated "N/A" on most answers and the information would have been incomplete without a site walk. Chairman Earl Tuson said it was more beneficial to the Board to have a completed application before them and a completed application was what was entered into the record.

Charlie Aznive said that, at the site walk, the side setback request was corrected after measuring the distances. Chairman Earl Tuson said that his understanding was that the proposed garage was for storage only. He wondered whether the garage could be used differently in the future and whether a future occupant of the property would need to incorporate a driveway. The Board discussed a previous application for a driveway requiring a reduced setback. Vice Chair Todd Phelps said that the issue in the past was the location of the septic but that seemed to no longer be an issue.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps made a motion to accept Application #Z23-22 as amended by the applicant. The motion was seconded by Peter Pitman. Alvin See commented that he wanted a condition added; Vice Chair Todd Phelps and Peter Pitman retracted their motions. Alvin See said the Board needed to make it clear that the Special Exception was for the garage itself and not for any future driveway. He suggested a condition stating the Special Exception would be accepted for a 14' x 28' garage and no other structure. Alvin See clarified that this included a driveway. Vice Chair Todd Phelps stated that the application did say that the reduced setback was for a garage.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps made a motion to accept Application #Z23-22 as amended to include the following condition:

1. The exception is for a garage only. Any other structure or encroachment will necessitate additional ZBA applications.

The motion was seconded by Alvin See. Roll call vote: Vice Chair Todd Phelps – yes, Peter Pitman – yes, Chairman Earl Tuson – yes, Charlie Aznive – yes, Alvin See – yes. All in favor, Application #Z23-22 was approved as amended.

New Business -

Application #Z23-25 Scribner Hill – Map 61 Lot 8 – Special Exception to allow for Wetland Buffer Impacts

The applicant's agent, Jon Rokeh of Rokeh Consulting, was present. Applicant Reid Lanpher was present. Abutter Linda Trefethen of 991 Route 106 was present. Julie Robinson of Loudon's Conservation Commission was present.

There is an existing parcel that has been used as camping and parking for the racetrack for several years. Reid Lanpher has bought the property. He is the owner of Central New Hampshire Trailers. They are proposing to subdivide the property into 3 parcels, for the trailers, tractors, and potential powersports. The parcel currently owned by the applicant is being used for all of the businesses and he's hoping to spread out a little.

They are presenting to the Board as there are quite a bit of wetlands on the site and the way they want to redevelop the site requires work within the wetland setback. As it exists, the wetland setback is in gravel. The proposed improvements reclaim greenspace and include swales along the wetland buffers to help with runoff. With what the applicant wants to do, there will be a perimeter and retention ponds. On the far north end, there is a gravel road about 12' wide that sneaks around to the rear. The applicant is proposing a wetland impact to make the area more usable.

Chairman Earl Tuson asked the Board if they wanted to do a site walk. Vice Chair Todd Phelps answered that he did want to because everything seemed a little vague.

Alvin See made a motion that Application #Z23-25 did not constitute a Development of Regional Impact. The motion was seconded by Peter Pitman. All in favor, the motion carried; Application #Z23-25 was not a Development of Regional Impact.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps made a motion to continue Application #Z23-25 to a site walk. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. All in favor, the motion carried; Application #Z23-25 was continued to a site walk on September 13, 2023, at 5:00 PM. There will be no additional notice.

Application #Z23-26 Cormier – Map 12 Lot 9 – Special Exception to allow for Attached ADU

The applicant, Todd Cormier, was present. No abutters were present. The builder, Jake Thompson, was also present.

Alvin See made a motion that Application #Z23-26 did not constitute a Development of Regional Impact. The motion was seconded by Charlie Aznive. All in favor, the motion carried; Application #Z23-26 was not a Development of Regional Impact.

The applicant described how they want to put an attached ADU

above the existing attached garage for the mother-in-law. They plan to take one bedroom from the main house and replace it with one above the garage so there is no impact on room count. The house has 3 bedrooms, and they will move it to 2 in the main and 1 in the suite. Peter Pitman said there needs to be an interior door and the applicant explained that there will be an interior door to access the shared

laundry room. The garage will be raised to incorporate the second level. It will be 725 square feet. The applicant shared a driveway with the neighbor.

The Board reviewed the points of the application. The applicant was requesting a special exception from Article V Section 509 to allow for an attached ADU above the attached garage.

Chairman Earl Tuson closed the public hearing and opened Board deliberations. There will be no injurious or detrimental effects on the neighborhood, there were no special conditions, there were no additional demands on municipal services, there would be no adverse impacts.

Chairman Earl Tuson closed the public hearing and opened Board deliberations.

Vice Chair Todd Phelps made a motion to accept application #Z23-26 as presented. The motion was seconded by Alvin See. Roll call vote: Alvin See – yes, Charlie Aznive – no, Chairman Earl Tuson – yes, Peter Pitman – yes, Vice Chair Todd Phelps – yes. 4 in favor, 1 opposed, Application #Z23-26 was approved.

Board Discussion & Correspondence:

Koufos Email: The Board received complaint #3 from the Koufos regarding the Major Home Occupation of Joe Osborne on Route 129. The Board is not able to do anything except hear applications presented. It is a quasi-judicial land-use Board. State laws spell out the abilities and restrictions of the ZBA. Appeals are limited to abutters who can clearly demonstrate the impact within 45 days. Peter Pitman said that the email quoted that the "Zoning Board who gave the approval has openly stated that they made a mistake". He said he wanted to know who stated this. Chairman Earl Tuson said they were not going to take testimony because they did not have an application in front of them. As government officials, they take criticism.

From the audience, abutters of Joe Osborne at Map 21 Lot 48 voiced their approval of the Major Home Occupation and had no complaints. Joe Osborne's girlfriend was also present and said they had checked with their abutters to ensure there were no complaints.

#### Adjournment:

Peter Pitman made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 9:45 PM. Charlie seconded the motion. All in favor. The meeting adjourned at 9:45 PM.

#### **Zoning Amendment Workshop Minutes**

#### August 17, 2023

Zoning Amendment Workshop #2

#### Attendance:

Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA): Alvin See, Alternate Ned Lizotte, Chairman Earl Tuson, Charlie Aznive

Fire Department/Code Enforcement: Chief Tom Blanchette

Chairman Jeff Green opened the workshop at 6:03 PM. Last month, the Boards discussed Major Home Occupations, Telecommunication Towers, and Agriculture.

#### Housekeeping Items

Chairman Jeff Green introduced a list of items that Lindsey Roy, Administrative Assistant, had gathered in the office. Many were considered to be housekeeping items.

1. 204.3(N) – "Accessory buildings can be built before the dwelling provided that the applicant is on the building permit list. Adopted 2007" The suggestion was to amend this part of the ordinance to remove "provided that the applicant is on the building permit list" as there is currently no building permit list in the Town. There had been a building permit list when the growth ordinance was in place and there was an influx of permits. Chairman Earl Tuson said that the building permit list was dropped in 2008. Rodney Phillips said he was not in favor of removing the whole item. Josh Pearl suggested changing the language to read "provided that the applicant has a building permit". Rodney Phillips suggested continuing with the suggested change of wording.

#### 2. Town Zoning Map -

The suggestion was to replace the map on page 20-21 of the Zoning Ordinance with an updated map from CNHRPC. The Board discussed moving the map to a newly created "201.5" rather than having it in the middle of the zones. Forrest Green suggested moving both the Map and the Table of Dimensions.

- 3. 301.4(B) 1. "Forestry and tree farming, using Best Management Practices Erosion Control on Timber Harvesting Operations in New Hampshire (April 1996)." The suggestion was to amend the version from April 1996 to the most current version of April 2016. The Boards also discussed adding "and as amended" to keep the ordinance current.
- 4. 301.4(B) 2. "Agriculture, including grazing, crop production and the construction of fences, using Best Management Practices for Agriculture (July 1993-Amended September 1998) provided that such use does not cause significant increases in surface or groundwater contamination by pesticides or other toxic or hazardous substances

and that such use will not cause or contribute to soil erosion." The suggestion was to amend the version from September 1998 to the most current version of July 2017. The Boards also discussed adding "and as amended" to keep the ordinance current.

- 5. 301.4(B) 4. "Conservation areas and nature trails using Best Management Practices for Erosion Control During Trail Maintenance and Construction [1994 update 1996]." The suggestion was to amend the version from 1996 to the most current version of January 2017. The Boards also discussed adding "and as amended" to keep the ordinance current.
- 6. 502.1 Chairman Earl Tuson suggested amending this section by adding "L" in front of "Permitted minor home occupations include, but are not limited to the following:"
- 7. 502.1 11. "Family daycare home involving not more than three children" The suggested amendment was to change "three" to "four" to match the state licensing requirements.
- 8. 502.2 11. "Daycare facilities caring for more than three children"

The suggestion was to change "three" to "four" to match the state licensing requirements.

Chairman Earl Tuson suggested adding "licensed" in front of "daycare facilities". Charlie Aznive suggested changing "three" to "four" and leaving the rest alone.

9. Kennel – There is no definition in the definitions section regarding what a "kennel" is. Alternate Alicha Kingsbury said that state law defines as a kennel as more than 5 dogs. Chief Tom Blanchette highly suggested that a definition is necessary. Alternate Alicha Kingsbury said she would look up the definition and RSA and send it to the Planning & Zoning Office.

#### **Intermodal Storage Containers**

Chief Tom Blanchette brought up the topic of intermodal storage containers. He said they were being placed on properties and properties around town were starting to look like storage or junk yards. The code for intermodal storage containers is 6.5 pages long. For a structure placed for more than 180 days, it is considered to be permanent. He suggested defining the number of square feet and number of containers allowed on a property. Rodney Phillips said he was not against them but they needed to follow a code. He asked if there was something that could be referenced. Chief Tom Blanchette said he would take the relevant parts of the code and send them to the Planning & Zoning Office to distribute to members. The Board discussed opinions regarding temporary and permanent containers on properties.

#### Conclusion

The next Zoning Amendment Workshop was scheduled for September 21, 2023, at 6:00 PM prior to the regularly scheduled meeting of the Planning Board.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:58 PM.

- III. Selectmen Miller made a motion to accept and approved the Consent Agenda as listed. Seconded by Selectmen Storrs. All in favor. Motion carried.
- IV. The Board met with Fire Chief Tom Blanchette:
- a. Chief Blanchette said their new administrator assistant started today. He is going to bring her around to the departments so she can meet everyone when time allows.
- b. Chief Blanchette said they had one incident over the weekend. There was an accident with the 2007 Freightliner Tanker, when trying to turn around in a driveway they dropped the rear tandems into a ditch. It ended up damaging the rear bumper. He received a few estimates and is just gathering the accident report. Once he has all the information, he will give to Brenda Pearl so she can send over to Primex.
- V. The Board met with Russ Pearl Road Agent:
- a. Road Agent Russ Pearl stated the rails on Lower Ridge bridge are now complete.
- b. Road Agent Russ Pearl said Loudon Ridge Rd and Currier are ready to start the final grading on 9/6/23 and paving on 9/8/23.
- c. Road Agent Russ Pearl requested permission to sell the old loader

- as a parts machine. It will be decommissioned before being sold. He was granted permission from the Board of Selectmen.
- VI. The Board met with Police Chief Kris Burgess:
- a. Chief Burgess said everyone in the department is well.
- b. Chief Burgess said Officer Gamble attended and completed armor school.
- c. Chief Burgess said Officer Nye attended and completed taser school.
- d. Chief Burgess read the stats from the speed trailer they had on Pleasant St from 8/17/23-8/25/23. There were 3,819 vehicles, 424 per day with an average speed of 25.34 mph. Chief Burgess will move it to a different location and face it a different way and will report data at next meeting.
- e. Chief Burgess said they have had 2 overdoses, which have resulted in death. There is currently an ongoing investigation.
- f. Chief Burgess stated the police cruisers had in car printers installed. It will make the process of tickets more efficient.
- VII. The Board reviewed new business:
- a. Chairman Maxfield stated the Police Department received a Highway Grant for \$8,200, which will allow for additional patrol officers.
- b. Chairman Maxfield stated the American Rescue Plan Act Committee (ARPA) has recommended the money for the town hall automatic doors, the highway brush cutter, the highway garage furnace, and the town website update be pulled from the ARPA fund.
- c. Selectmen Miller made a motion to approve an expenditure from the ARPA fund in the amount of \$3,200 for the town hall building to have automatic doors installed. Motion seconded by Selectmen Storrs. All in favor. Motion carried.
- d. Selectmen Miller made a motion to approve an expenditure from the ARPA fund in the amount of \$15,000 for a brush cutter for the highway department. Motion seconded by Selectmen Storrs. All in favor. Motion carried.
- e. Selectmen Miller made a motion to approve an expenditure from the ARPA fund in the amount of \$13,935 for a used highway garage oil furnace. Motion seconded by Selectmen Storrs. All in favor. Motion carried.
- f. Selectmen Miller made a motion to approve an expenditure from the ARPA fund in the amount of \$3,980, which will include a one-time startup fee of \$500 and a one-time annual fee in the amount of \$3,480 to make the Loudon town website ADA complaint. Motion seconded by Selectmen Storrs. All in favor. Motion carried.
- g. Chairman Maxfield signed a cemetery deed for Moore Cemetery.
- h. Chairman Maxfield stated the Snow Shakers club is requesting that the following class VI roads be allowed for use of snowmobiles in the winter. He asked if this request could be good for 5 year and can be changed at any time. The roads are as following: Pitman

Rd, Kenny Rd, Gues Meadow Rd, Taylor Haines Rd, and Shaw Rd. Selectmen Miller made a motion to accept. Motion seconded by Selectmen Storrs. All in favor. Motion carried.

i. Chairman Maxfield stated 14 Flagg Road in Loudon, NH was looking for their Pistols and Revolvers license to sell. Selectmen Miller made a motion to approve license to sell. Motion seconded by Selectmen Storrs. All in favor. Motion carried.

VIII. Chairman Maxfield stated they received two bids for the stairs at Clough Pond Beach. The first bid was received by Morello Construction in Holderness, NH. The bid was for \$33,390. The second bid was received from Tasker Landscaping in Loudon, NH. The bid was for \$17,095.84. Selectmen Miller made a motion to accept Tasker Landscaping Bid motion was seconded by Selectmen Storrs. All in favor. Motion carried.

IX. Chairman Maxfield open the ARPA Committee meeting. The ARPA Committee decided that it was best that the money for the Clough Beach stairs be taken from the ARPA fund. The ARPA committee will submit a memo to the Board of Selectmen suggestion they take the money from the ARPA fund. This memo will be read at the next Selectmen's meeting on 9/19/2023.

- X. Chairman Maxfield recognized Alicha Kingsbury 293 Bear Hill Road; Alicha Kingsbury wanted to congratulate the Loudon Fire Department on winning first place at the Firemen's Muster at the Lancaster Fair.
- XI. Chairman Maxfield recognized Jeff Leonard 122 Lower Ridge Road; Mr. Leonard was inquiring about having his application fees waived for his building permits. He stated that

he has heard some fees were waived. The selectmen are not aware of any permit fees being waived but will look into it.

XII. Chairman Maxfield recognized Katherine Pitman 173 Lovejoy Road; Mrs. Pitman stated she recalled seeing a check from Agway for a building permit within the last few months.

XIII. Selectmen Miller made a motion to enter Non-Public session with Chirs Murdough and David Cossette at 6:55 pm under RSA 91-A:3, II (a) Matters which if discussed in public, would likely affect adversely the reputation of any person, other than a member of this board, unless such person request an open meeting. Seconded by Selectman pay or poverty of the applicant Storrs. Roll call vote, Selectman Miller- Yes, Selectman Storrs- Yes, Chairman Maxfield- Yes. All in favor. Motion carried. Selectman Miller made a motion to come out of Non-Public Session at 7:34 pm. Seconded by Selectman Storrs. All in favor. Motion carried. Selectman Miller made a motion to seal the minutes. Seconded by Selectman Storrs. Roll call vote, Selectman Miller- Yes, Selectman Storrs- Yes, Chairman Maxfield- Yes. All in favor. Motion carried.

XIV. Selectmen Storrs made a motion at 7:35 pm to adjourn. Motion seconded by Selectmen Miller. All in favor. Motion carried.


